I. Read the given passage and answer the following questions by choosing the most appropriate response.

The advent of social media has dramatically transformed the way individuals consume and share information. In earlier times, people largely depended on newspapers, radio, or

television as their primary sources of knowledge about the world. These were institutions that followed established editorial practices and fact-checking processes. With the rise of digital platforms, however, the traditional ‘gatekeepers’ of information have been bypassed. Today, anyone with internet access can create content, express an opinion, or broadcast an idea to a global audience within seconds. This shift has certainly democratized access and given voice to communities and individuals who were often ignored by mainstream media. Yet, this democratization comes with challenges. Alongside genuine voices, social media has also amplified misinformation, rumours, and half-truths. Unlike traditional journalism, where accountability and verification are built into the system, social media thrives on speed, virality, and emotion. A misleading headline, a misinterpreted statistic, or even a doctored image can travel across the world before fact-checkers have the chance to intervene. The consequences of such unchecked information can be serious, ranging from the spread of fear and panic to the manipulation of public opinion. The impact of this transformation extends beyond individual users to institutions and democracies. Political campaigns, corporate branding, and even social movements are now shaped by algorithms that decide what people see and when they see it. These algorithms prioritize engagement, often promoting content that provokes stronger emotional reactions rather than balanced analysis. As a result, echo chambers form, online spaces where people are repeatedly exposed to opinions that mirror their own, reinforcing biases and reducing openness to differing perspectives. This has contributed to increasing polarization in societies across the world. Moreover, the competition for attention has blurred the line between information and entertainment, leading to the rise of sensationalism even in serious public discourse. The credibility of expertise too has been undermined, as opinions from unverified sources are often placed on the same footing as evidence-based knowledge. In response, several governments and technology companies are exploring ways to promote digital literacy, enhance transparency in algorithms, and strengthen fact-checking collaborations. Ultimately, the challenge lies in balancing the openness of digital spaces with mechanisms that ensure responsibility and trustworthiness in public communication.

1. According to the passage, what is a key difference between traditional media and social media?

Correct Answer: (C) Traditional media is based on facts; social media is driven by emotion.

Solution:

Step 1: Understanding the Concept: The question asks for a comparison between traditional media and social media based on the text.

Step 2: Analysis of the Text: The passage explicitly states: "Unlike traditional journalism, where accountability and verification are built into the system, social media thrives on speed, virality, and emotion." It also mentions that traditional institutions "followed established editorial practices and fact-checking processes."

Step 3: Evaluating Options:

- (A) The passage mentions social media blurs the line between information and entertainment, but does not claim traditional media is *more* entertaining.

- (B) The passage implies social media lacks the regulations/gatekeeping of traditional media.
- (C) This aligns with the text which contrasts the "verification" (facts) of traditional media with the "emotion" driving social media.
- (D) The text states the opposite: "anyone... can... broadcast an idea to a global audience."

Step 4: Conclusion: Option (C) accurately reflects the distinction made in the passage.

 Quick Tip

When answering compare-and-contrast questions in reading comprehension, look for transition words like "Unlike," "However," or "In contrast" in the passage to find the direct comparison.

2. Which of the following is NOT mentioned as a consequence of the spread of unchecked information via social media?

- (A) Spread of fear and panic
- (B) Improvement in media literacy
- (C) Manipulation of public opinion
- (D) Amplification of misinformation

Correct Answer: (B) Improvement in media literacy

Solution:

Step 1: Locate relevant information: The passage discusses consequences of unchecked information in the middle section.

Step 2: Verify Options against Text:

- (A) "Spread of fear and panic" is explicitly mentioned ("The consequences... ranging from the spread of fear and panic").
- (C) "Manipulation of public opinion" is explicitly mentioned in the same sentence.

3. What is implied by the phrase 'traditional gatekeepers of information have been bypassed'?

- (A) Traditional media is more widely used than ever
- (B) Social media companies have begun hiring editors
- (C) Traditional media is no longer the sole source of information
- (D) Fact-checking has become more robust in the digital era

Correct Answer: (C) Traditional media is no longer the sole source of information

Solution:

Step 1: Analyze the phrase context: The text says, "In earlier times, people largely depended on newspapers... With the rise of digital platforms, however, the traditional 'gatekeepers' of information have been bypassed. Today, anyone... can create content."

Step 2: Interpret the meaning: "Gatekeepers" refers to the editors and journalists who controlled what was published. "Bypassed" means people can now go around them to publish or access information directly.

Step 3: Evaluate Options:

- (A) Incorrect. The text implies a shift *away* from exclusive dependence on traditional media.
- (B) Incorrect. The text does not discuss hiring practices here.
- (C) Correct. Because the gatekeepers are bypassed, they no longer control the flow, meaning they are not the sole source.
- (D) Incorrect. The text states fact-checking often happens *too late* in the digital era.

💡 Quick Tip

Understand metaphors in context. "Gatekeepers" implies control/restriction. "Bypassing" implies finding a new route. This suggests the removal of the monopoly on information flow.

4. Which of the following best captures the central idea of the passage?

Correct Answer: (C) Social media has democratized information sharing but introduced challenges such as misinformation.

Solution:

Step 1: Identify the main theme: The passage begins by acknowledging the "transformation" and "democratization" brought by social media. It then spends significant space discussing the "challenges" (misinformation, algorithms, polarization) and concludes with the need for "balancing openness with responsibility."

Step 2: Evaluate Options:

- (A) Too extreme. It says traditional media is "bypassed" as gatekeepers, not that it is obsolete.
- (B) Too specific. Propaganda is a detail, not the central idea.
- (C) This option covers both the positive aspect (democratization) and the negative aspect (challenges/misinformation), summarising the entire flow of the passage.
- (D) Too extreme. The text says people "largely depended" in the past, but doesn't say they rely for "no" information now.

 Quick Tip

The central idea usually covers the beginning (introduction of topic), the middle (main arguments), and the end (conclusion/implication). Look for the option that is comprehensive and balanced.

5. In the context of the above passage, consider the following Assertion (A) and Reason (R), and select the appropriate option:

Assertion (A): Social media allows anyone with internet access to broadcast ideas to a global audience.

Reason (R): Traditional media platforms were exclusively available to trained journalists and editors.

- (A) Both (A) and (R) are true, and (R) is the correct explanation of (A).
(B) Both (A) and (R) are true, but (R) is not the correct explanation of (A).
(C) (A) is true, but (R) is false.
(D) (A) is false, but (R) is true.

Correct Answer: (B) Both (A) and (R) are true, but (R) is not the correct explanation of (A).

Solution:

Step 1: Analyze Assertion (A): "Social media allows anyone with internet access to broadcast ideas to a global audience." **Verdict:** True. This is explicitly stated in the passage ("Today, anyone with internet access can... broadcast an idea...").

Step 2: Analyze Reason (R): "Traditional media platforms were exclusively available to trained journalists and editors." **Verdict:** True (in context). The passage states traditional media were "institutions that followed established editorial practices" and acted as "gatekeepers." While the word "exclusively" is strong, in the context of mass broadcasting capability, it holds true that the general public could not directly broadcast without these intermediaries.

Step 3: Analyze the Causality (Does R explain A?): Does the fact that traditional media was exclusive *cause* social media to have global reach? No. Social media has global reach because of technological advancements (internet, algorithms, platform architecture). The exclusivity of traditional media explains why the shift is significant or why social media is a "bypass," but it is not the functional *cause* of social media's capability.

Conclusion: Both statements are correct based on the text, but R is not the functional explanation for A.

 Quick Tip

For Assertion-Reason questions, add the word "because" between them. "Social media allows global broadcast BECAUSE traditional media was exclusive." This logic is weak; the technology enables the broadcast, not the history of the old medium.

6. Which of the following approaches is identified in the passage as a constructive response to the challenges created by social media's algorithm-driven information environment?

Solution:

- (B) Incorrect. The text mentions "balancing openness," not pre-publication regulation (censorship).
- (C) Incorrect. The text mentions institutional involvement (governments/tech companies).
- (D) Incorrect. This is the problem (prioritizing engagement), not the solution.

Look at the concluding sentences of a passage for "solutions," "responses," or "future outlooks."

7. Which of the following best illustrates the functioning of an 'echo chamber' on social media, as described in the passage?

- (C) This matches the definition perfectly: the user sees content mirroring their own opinions due to algorithmic prioritization.

I have still to be brother to a Prince, though I once came near to kinship with what might have been a veritable King, and was promised the reversion of a Kingdom, army, law-courts,

revenue and policy, all complete. But, today, I greatly fear that my King is dead, and if I want a crown I must go and hunt it for myself. The beginning of everything was in a railway train upon the road to Mhow from Ajmir. There had been a deficit in the Budget, which necessitated travelling, not Second class, which is only half as dear as First class, but by Intermediate, which is very awful indeed. There are no cushions in the Intermediate class, and the population is either Intermediate, which is Eurasian, or native, which for a long night journey is nasty; or Loafer, which is amusing though intoxicated. Intermediates do not patronize refreshment rooms. They carry their food in bundles and pots, and buy sweets from the native sweet meat sellers, and drink the roadside water. That is why in the hot weather Intermediates are taken out of the carriages dead, and in all weathers are most properly looked down upon. My particular Intermediate happened to be empty till I reached Nasirabad, when a huge gentleman in shirt sleeves entered, and, following the custom of Intermediates, passed the time of day. He was a wanderer and a vagabond like myself, but with an educated taste for alcohol. He told daring tales of things he had seen and done, of out of the way corners of the Empire into which he had penetrated, and of adventures in which he risked his life for a few days' food. "If India was filled with men like you and me, not knowing more than the crows where they'd get their next day's rations, it isn't seventy millions of revenue the land would be paying, it's seven hundred million," said he; and as I looked at his mouth and chin I was disposed to agree with him. We talked politics, the politics of Loaferdom that sees things from the underside where the lath and plaster is not smoothed off, and we talked postal arrangements because my friend wanted to send a telegram back from the next station to Ajmir, which is the turning off place from the Bombay to the Mhow line as you travel westward. He had the air of one who had seen strange countries and stranger men, yet bore himself without vanity. There was a restless light in his eyes, the sort that belongs to men who have lived too long without a fixed purpose. When he spoke of the Empire, it was not with loyalty nor with bitterness, but with the detached amusement of one who has played his part and lost interest in the game. His laughter came easily, though it seemed to echo from some remembered hardship. It struck me then that his stories were less of adventure than of survival.

Conclusion: Option (B) combines the physical lack (cushions) with the social lack (respectable company) mentioned in the text.

Step 3: Conclusion: It refers to a view of the world/politics from the perspective of those at the bottom, seeing the gritty reality rather than the polished surface. This matches Option (D).

 Quick Tip

Analyze the imagery. "Underside" and "not smoothed off" suggest a raw, bottom-up perspective, contrasting with the polished view of the elite.

12. What does the phrase ‘looked at his mouth and chin’ suggest in context?

- (A) He was assessing his character for trustworthiness.

- (D) He found him good looking and decent.

Correct Answer: (A) He was assessing his character for trustworthiness.

Solution:

Step 1: Contextualize the Action: The stranger makes a bold claim about extracting revenue from India. The narrator says, “as I looked at his mouth and chin I was disposed to agree with him.”

Step 2: Literary Convention (Physiognomy): In literature (especially of this era), the set of the mouth and the strength of the chin were often used as indicators of a person’s determination, strength of will, and character.

Step 3: Reasoning: The narrator checks the man’s face to see if he is just a blabbering drunk or a man of substance. Seeing a strong mouth/chin leads him to “agree,” meaning he judges the man to be capable and serious.

Conclusion: Option (A) best fits this analytical action.

- (C) Incorrect. The man "bore himself without vanity" and laughed easily; he wasn't begging for sympathy.
- (D) Incorrect. The narrator was "disposed to agree" and engaged in conversation ("we talked politics"), not weary.
