Moral education centres upon this conception of the school as a mode of social life, that the best and the deepest moral training is precisely that which one gets through having to enter into proper relations with others in a unity of work and thought. The present educational systems, so far as they destroy or neglect this unity, render it difficult or impossible to get any genuine, regular moral training.

1. According to the writer, the school is a form of _____.

5. Find the word from the passage that is a synonym of accurate

The "a" vs. "an" rule is about sounds, not letters! Always say the word aloud to check if it starts with a vowel sound (a, e, i, o, u sounds) or a consonant sound. Examples: an hour, a university.

Solution:

The correct sentence is "This is **the** car my friend bought last week."

 Quick Tip

Use "the" when the noun is specific or has been previously mentioned. Use "a/an" for a general or first-time mention of a noun. If a noun is followed by a modifying clause (like "that I saw" or "which you bought"), it's usually specific and needs "the".

"Sure of" and "sure about" are both correct idioms. However, "sure of" is often preferred when expressing confidence in a fact or an outcome.

Had he studied hard

The correct completion is "would have", making the sentence "Had he studied hard, he would have passed."

💡 Quick Tip

Recognize the third conditional structure, used for speculating about past events.

When the 'if' is dropped, the clause starts with 'Had'. The main clause will always use 'would have' (or 'could have'/'might have') + past participle.

The correct sentence is "I wish I **knew** her address."

Remember the tenses for "I wish" clauses:

- Wish about the present/future: 'I wish + simple past' (e.g., I wish I had a car).
- Wish about the past (regret): 'I wish + past perfect' (e.g., I wish I had studied harder).

When converting sentences with verbs of perception + object + participle (e.g., "I saw him doing something"), a common passive structure is: Subject + verb of perception + new object + being + past participle + by + agent. For example, "I saw the thing being done by him."
