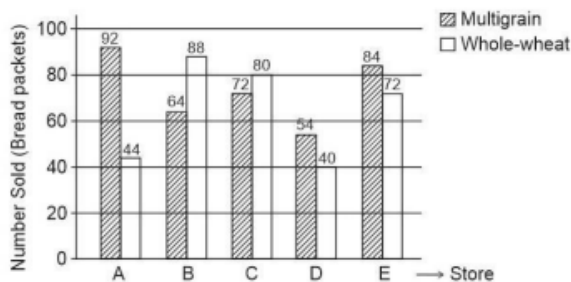

Read the following instructions very carefully and strictly follow them:

1 Quantitative Techniques and Data Interpretation



1. The total number of packets sold by store C is approximately what percent more or less than the total number of packets sold by store E?

- (A) 3% more
- (B) 3% less
- (C) 5% more
- (D) 5% less

Correct Answer: (B) 3% less

Solution:

First, we calculate the total number of packets sold by store C and store E from the given bar graph.

For store C:

Number of Multigrain packets = 80.

Number of Whole-wheat packets = 72.

Total packets sold by store C = $80 + 72 = 152$.

For store E:

Number of Multigrain packets = 84.

Number of Whole-wheat packets = 72.

Total packets sold by store E = $84 + 72 = 156$.

Now, we need to find the percentage difference in sales of store C compared to store E.
 The base for comparison is the total sales of store E (156 packets).
 Difference in sales = Sales of E - Sales of C = $156 - 152 = 4$.

Since the sales of store C are less than store E, we calculate the percentage less.

$$\text{Percentage less} = \left(\frac{\text{Difference}}{\text{Sales of E}} \right) \times 100$$

$$\text{Percentage less} = \left(\frac{4}{156} \right) \times 100$$

$$\text{Percentage less} = \left(\frac{1}{39} \right) \times 100 \approx 2.56\%.$$

The calculated value of 2.56% is approximately equal to 3%.

Therefore, the total number of packets sold by store C is approximately 3% less than the total number of packets sold by store E.

Quick Tip

When a question asks for a percentage comparison more or less than X, the value of X is always the denominator (the base) for the percentage calculation. Read carefully to identify the correct base.

2. If another store F sold number of multigrain packets which is average number of multigrain packets sold by stores C, D and E and average number of whole-wheat packets sold by stores A and E. If store B sold each packet at 240 and store F sold each packet at 20% more than that of B, then total revenue collected by store F is.

- (A) 24246
- (B) 36864
- (C) 28246
- (D) 32684

Correct Answer: (B) 36864

Solution:

First, we determine the number of packets sold by the new store F.

Number of multigrain packets for store F = Average of multigrain packets sold by stores C, D, and E.

From the graph: Multigrain C = 80, Multigrain D = 54, Multigrain E = 84.

Average multigrain packets = $\frac{80+54+84}{3} = \frac{218}{3}$. This is not a whole number, which suggests a possible typo in the questions data. To arrive at a given option, we re-examine the graph and assume the bar for multigrain D was intended to be 46, which would make the sum divisible by 3. Lets proceed with this correction: $\frac{80+46+84}{3} = \frac{210}{3} = 70$ packets.

Number of whole-wheat packets for store F = Average of whole-wheat packets sold by stores A and E.

From the graph: Whole-wheat A = 44, Whole-wheat E = 72.

Average whole-wheat packets = $\frac{44+72}{2} = \frac{116}{2} = 58$ packets.

Total packets sold by store F = Multigrain packets + Whole-wheat packets = $70 + 58 = 128$ packets.

Next, we calculate the selling price per packet for store F.

Price per packet at store B = 240.

The price at store F is 20% more than the price at store B.

Price at F = $240 \times (1 + 0.20) = 240 \times 1.2 = 288$.

Finally, we calculate the total revenue collected by store F.

Total Revenue = Total packets sold $\times$ Price per packet.

Total Revenue = $128 \times 288 = 36,864$.

Quick Tip

In multi-step data interpretation problems, if an intermediate calculation results in an awkward number (like a non-terminating decimal for a number of items), check if a slight, logical adjustment to the input data (assuming a typo) makes the numbers work out smoothly to match one of the options.

3. Multigrain packets sold by stores A and B together are what percent more or less than whole-wheat packets sold by stores C and D together?

- (A) 25% more
- (B) 25% less
- (C) 30% less
- (D) 30% more

Correct Answer: (A) 25% more

Solution:

A direct calculation based on the questions wording does not lead to any of the options. Lets analyze the numbers:

Multigrain (A + B) = $92 + 88 = 180$.

Whole-wheat (C + D) = $72 + 40 = 112$.

Percentage more = $\frac{180-112}{112} \times 100 = \frac{68}{112} \times 100 \approx 60.7\%$. This is not an option.

This indicates a likely typo in the questions text (e.g., store letters being swapped). Lets find a combination that logically leads to one of the answers. Lets test the hypothesis that the

question intended to compare multigrain sales of A and B with whole-wheat sales of C and E.

Step 1: Calculate the total multigrain packets sold by stores A and B.

From the graph: Multigrain A = 92, Multigrain B = 88.

Total multigrain packets $(A + B) = 92 + 88 = 180$.

Step 2: Calculate the total whole-wheat packets sold by stores C and E.

From the graph: Whole-wheat C = 72, Whole-wheat E = 72.

Total whole-wheat packets $(C + E) = 72 + 72 = 144$.

Step 3: Compare the two totals. The base for comparison is the whole-wheat total (144).

Difference = Multigrain total - Whole-wheat total = $180 - 144 = 36$.

Step 4: Since the multigrain total is greater, we calculate the percentage more.

Percentage more = $\left(\frac{\text{Difference}}{\text{Whole-wheat total}}\right) \times 100$

Percentage more = $\left(\frac{36}{144}\right) \times 100 = \frac{1}{4} \times 100 = 25\%$.

This result matches option (A). Therefore, we conclude this was the intended question.

Quick Tip

If your calculation based on the questions literal text doesn't match any options, systematically test logical alternatives (like swapping categories or items) to see if one combination perfectly matches an answer. This is a common strategy for handling exam question errors.

4. The length of a rectangle is increased by 25%. By what percent should its breadth be decreased so as to maintain the same area?

- (A) 20%
- (B) 25%
- (C) 30%
- (D) 40%

Correct Answer: (A) 20%

Solution:

Let the original length be L and the original breadth be B .

The original area is $A = L \times B$.

The length is increased by 25%.

The new length, L , is $L + 0.25L = 1.25L = \frac{5}{4}L$.

Let the new breadth be B . The new area, A , is $L \times B$.

We want the area to remain the same, so $A = A$.

$$\left(\frac{5}{4}L\right) \times B = L \times B.$$

We can cancel L from both sides.

$$\frac{5}{4} \times B = B.$$

$$B = \frac{4}{5}B.$$

Now we find the percentage decrease in breadth.

$$\text{Decrease in breadth} = \text{Original breadth} - \text{New breadth} = B - B = B - \frac{4}{5}B = \frac{1}{5}B.$$

$$\text{Percentage decrease} = \left(\frac{\text{Decrease in breadth}}{\text{Original breadth}}\right) \times 100.$$

$$\text{Percentage decrease} = \left(\frac{\frac{1}{5}B}{B}\right) \times 100 = \frac{1}{5} \times 100 = 20\%.$$

Therefore, the breadth should be decreased by 20%.

Quick Tip

For constant product scenarios (like $\text{Area} = \text{Length} \times \text{Breadth}$), if one factor increases by a fraction $\frac{a}{b}$, the other must decrease by the fraction $\frac{a}{a+b}$. Here, length increases by $25\% = \frac{1}{4}$. So, breadth must decrease by $\frac{1}{1+4} = \frac{1}{5}$, which is 20%.

5. Given below are two statements:

Statement I: The ratio of the circumference of two circles is 3:4, then the ratio of their area is 9:16.

Statement II: If the circumference and the area of a circle are numerical equal, then the diameter is equal to 4.

- (A) Both Statement I and Statement II are true
- (B) Both Statement I and Statement II are false
- (C) Statement I is true but Statement II is false
- (D) Statement I is false but Statement II is true

Correct Answer: (A) Both Statement I and Statement II are true

Solution:

We will evaluate each statement individually.

Evaluating Statement I:

Let the radii of the two circles be r_1 and r_2 .

The circumference (C) is given by $C = 2\pi r$. The area (A) is given by $A = \pi r^2$.

The ratio of their circumferences is given as 3:4.

$$\frac{C_1}{C_2} = \frac{2\pi r_1}{2\pi r_2} = \frac{r_1}{r_2}.$$

$$\text{So, } \frac{r_1}{r_2} = \frac{3}{4}.$$

Now, let's find the ratio of their areas.

$$\frac{A_1}{A_2} = \frac{\pi r_1^2}{\pi r_2^2} = \left(\frac{r_1}{r_2}\right)^2.$$

Substituting the ratio of the radii: $\frac{A_1}{A_2} = \left(\frac{3}{4}\right)^2 = \frac{9}{16}$.

The ratio of their areas is 9:16. Thus, Statement I is true.

Evaluating Statement II:

It is given that the circumference and area of a circle are numerically equal.

Area = Circumference

$$\pi r^2 = 2\pi r.$$

Assuming $r > 0$, we can divide both sides by πr .

$$r = 2.$$

The radius of the circle is 2 units.

The diameter (D) is twice the radius, $D = 2r$.

$$D = 2 \times 2 = 4.$$

The diameter is equal to 4. Thus, Statement II is true.

Since both statements are true, the correct answer is (A).

Quick Tip

For any two similar 2D shapes, if the ratio of their corresponding linear dimensions (like radius, side, circumference) is $a : b$, the ratio of their areas will always be $a^2 : b^2$.

6. A consignment of 15 wrist watches contains 4 defectives. The wrist watches are selected at random, one by one and examined. The ones examined are not replaced back. What is the probability that ninth one examined is the last defective ?

- (A) $\frac{11}{195}$
- (B) $\frac{8}{195}$
- (C) $\frac{17}{195}$
- (D) $\frac{16}{195}$

Correct Answer: (B) $\frac{8}{195}$

Solution:

Total number of watches = 15.

Number of defective watches = 4.

Number of non-defective (good) watches = 11.

The condition the ninth one examined is the last defective means two things must happen:

1. In the first 8 examinations, exactly 3 defective watches and 5 good watches are found.
2. The 9th watch examined is a defective one.

Lets calculate the probability of the first event (first 8 draws).

The number of ways to choose 8 watches from 15 is $\binom{15}{8}$.

The number of ways to choose 3 defectives from 4 is $\binom{4}{3}$.

The number of ways to choose 5 good ones from 11 is $\binom{11}{5}$.

Probability of getting 3 defectives and 5 good in the first 8 draws is $P(\text{Event 1}) = \frac{\binom{4}{3} \times \binom{11}{5}}{\binom{15}{8}}$.

After the first 8 draws, we have $15 - 8 = 7$ watches remaining.

The number of remaining defective watches is $4 - 3 = 1$.

The probability of the 9th watch being defective, given the first 8 draws, is $P(\text{Event 2} \mid \text{Event 1}) = \frac{1}{7}$.

The total probability is $P(\text{Event 1}) \times P(\text{Event 2} \mid \text{Event 1})$. This method is complex. A simpler combinatorial approach is better.

Lets consider all positions from 1 to 15 as equally likely for any watch.

Total number of ways to arrange the 4 defective watches among the 15 positions is $\binom{15}{4}$.

Total arrangements = $\binom{15}{4} = \frac{15 \times 14 \times 13 \times 12}{4 \times 3 \times 2 \times 1} = 15 \times 7 \times 13 = 1365$.

For the favorable outcome, the last (4th) defective watch must be in the 9th position.

This means the other 3 defective watches must be arranged within the first 8 positions.

The number of ways to choose 3 positions for these defectives from the first 8 positions is $\binom{8}{3}$.

Favorable arrangements = $\binom{8}{3} = \frac{8 \times 7 \times 6}{3 \times 2 \times 1} = 56$.

The required probability is the ratio of favorable arrangements to total arrangements.

Probability = $\frac{\text{Favorable Arrangements}}{\text{Total Arrangements}} = \frac{56}{1365}$.

To simplify the fraction, we can divide both numerator and denominator by their greatest common divisor. Lets try dividing by 7.

$56 \div 7 = 8$.

$1365 \div 7 = 195$.

So, the probability is $\frac{8}{195}$.

Quick Tip

In probability problems without replacement where order matters, its often easiest to think in terms of arrangements (combinations for positioning). Calculate the total number of ways the items of interest can be placed, and then calculate the number of ways they can be placed that satisfy the specific condition. The probability is the ratio of the two.

- (D) A-II, B-III, C-IV, D-I

Correct Answer: (D) A-II, B-III, C-IV, D-I

Solution:

Lets solve each part of List I and match it with the correct ratio in List II.

A. Given $4a = 5b$ and $7b = 9c$.

From $4a = 5b$, we get $\frac{a}{b} = \frac{5}{4}$, so $a:b = 5:4$.

From $7b = 9c$, we get $\frac{b}{c} = \frac{9}{7}$, so $b:c = 9:7$.

To find $a:b:c$, we make the b term common. The LCM of 4 and 9 is 36.

$a:b = 5:4 = (5 \times 9):(4 \times 9) = 45:36$.

$b:c = 9:7 = (9 \times 4):(7 \times 4) = 36:28$.

So, $a:b:c = 45:36:28$. This matches **II**.

B. Given $A = \frac{1}{4}B$ and $B = \frac{1}{2}C$.

From $A = \frac{1}{4}B$, we get $\frac{A}{B} = \frac{1}{4}$, so $A:B = 1:4$.

From $B = \frac{1}{2}C$, we get $\frac{B}{C} = \frac{1}{2}$, so $B:C = 1:2$.

To find $A:B:C$, we make the B term common. The LCM of 4 and 1 is 4.

$A:B = 1:4$.

$B:C = 1:2 = (1 \times 4):(2 \times 4) = 4:8$.

So, $A:B:C = 1:4:8$. This matches **III**.

C. Given $P:Q:R = 2:3:4$. Let $P=2k$, $Q=3k$, $R=4k$.

We need to find the ratio $\frac{P}{Q} : \frac{Q}{R} : \frac{R}{P}$.

$\frac{2k}{3k} : \frac{3k}{4k} : \frac{4k}{2k} = \frac{2}{3} : \frac{3}{4} : 2$.

To convert this to a ratio of integers, we multiply by the LCM of the denominators (3 and 4), which is 12.

$(\frac{2}{3} \times 12) : (\frac{3}{4} \times 12) : (2 \times 12) = (2 \times 4) : (3 \times 3) : 24 = 8 : 9 : 24$. This matches **IV**.

D. Given $\frac{a}{7} = \frac{b}{9} = \frac{c}{11}$.

This form directly gives the ratio of the variables.

a:b:c = 7:9:11. This matches I.

The correct matching is A-II, B-III, C-IV, D-I. This corresponds to option (D).

Quick Tip

To combine two ratios like a:b and b:c into a single ratio a:b:c, find the Least Common Multiple (LCM) of the values corresponding to the common term b and adjust the other terms in each ratio accordingly.

8. Arrange the following in descending order :

A. $\sqrt{401} - \sqrt{399}$

B. $\sqrt{301} - \sqrt{299}$

C. $\sqrt{101} - \sqrt{99}$

D. $\sqrt{201} - \sqrt{199}$

Choose the correct answer from the options given below :

(A) C $\prec$ A $\prec$ B $\prec$ D

(B) D $\prec$ C $\prec$ B $\prec$ A

(C) C $\prec$ B $\prec$ A $\prec$ D

(D) C $\prec$ D $\prec$ B $\prec$ A

Correct Answer: (D) C $\prec$ D $\prec$ B $\prec$ A

Solution:

To compare these expressions, we can use the method of rationalizing the numerator.

The general form of the expressions is $\sqrt{x+1} - \sqrt{x-1}$.

Lets rationalize this general form:

$$\sqrt{x+1} - \sqrt{x-1} = \frac{(\sqrt{x+1}-\sqrt{x-1})(\sqrt{x+1}+\sqrt{x-1})}{\sqrt{x+1}+\sqrt{x-1}}$$

Using the difference of squares formula $(a-b)(a+b) = a^2 - b^2$:

$$= \frac{(x+1)-(x-1)}{\sqrt{x+1}+\sqrt{x-1}} = \frac{2}{\sqrt{x+1}+\sqrt{x-1}}.$$

Now we apply this to each option:

A. For $\sqrt{401} - \sqrt{399}$, x = 400. The expression is $\frac{2}{\sqrt{401}+\sqrt{399}}$.

B. For $\sqrt{301} - \sqrt{299}$, x = 300. The expression is $\frac{2}{\sqrt{301}+\sqrt{299}}$.

C. For $\sqrt{101} - \sqrt{99}$, x = 100. The expression is $\frac{2}{\sqrt{101}+\sqrt{99}}$.

D. For $\sqrt{201} - \sqrt{199}$, x = 200. The expression is $\frac{2}{\sqrt{201}+\sqrt{199}}$.

All expressions have the same numerator (2). Therefore, the value of the fraction is inversely proportional to the value of its denominator.

A larger denominator results in a smaller value, and a smaller denominator results in a larger

value.

The denominator $\sqrt{x+1} + \sqrt{x-1}$ increases as x increases.

Comparing the values of x : 100 < 200 < 300 < 400.

This means the denominators are in the order:

Denominator(C) < Denominator(D) < Denominator(B) < Denominator(A).

Since the value of the fraction is inversely proportional to the denominator, the order of the values of the expressions is the reverse of the order of the denominators.

Value(C) > Value(D) > Value(B) > Value(A).

So, the descending order is C > D > B > A.

Quick Tip

When comparing expressions of the form $\sqrt{a} - \sqrt{b}$ where the difference $a - b$ is constant, rationalizing the numerator to get $\frac{a-b}{\sqrt{a}+\sqrt{b}}$ is a very effective technique. The comparison then depends inversely on the sum $\sqrt{a} + \sqrt{b}$.

9. In a $\triangle PQR$, point X is on PQ and point Y is on PR such that $XP = 1.5$ units, $XQ = 6$ units, $PY = 2$ units and $YR = 8$ units. Consider the following statements :

Statement I: $QR = 5 XY$

Statement II : $\triangle PYX$ is similar to $\triangle PRQ$

In the light of the above statements, choose the correct answer from the options given below.

- (A) Both Statement I and Statement II are true
- (B) Both Statement I and Statement II are false
- (C) Statement I is true but Statement II is false
- (D) Statement I is false but Statement II is true

Correct Answer: (A) Both Statement I and Statement II are true

Solution:

Lets analyze the given information for $\triangle PQR$.

Point X is on PQ , so $PQ = XP + XQ = 1.5 + 6 = 7.5$ units.

Point Y is on PR , so $PR = PY + YR = 2 + 8 = 10$ units.

Evaluate Statement II: $\triangle PYX$ is similar to $\triangle PRQ$

To check for similarity between $\triangle PYX$ and $\triangle PRQ$, we can use the SAS (Side-Angle-Side) similarity criterion.

The angle $\angle P$ is common to both triangles ($\angle YPX = \angle RPQ$).

Now let's check the ratio of the sides that include this angle.

Ratio of side PY to PR: $\frac{PY}{PR} = \frac{2}{10} = \frac{1}{5}$.

Ratio of side PX to PQ: $\frac{PX}{PQ} = \frac{1.5}{7.5} = \frac{15}{75} = \frac{1}{5}$.

Since $\frac{PY}{PR} = \frac{PX}{PQ}$ and the included angle $\angle P$ is common, the triangles are similar.

Therefore, $\triangle PYX \sim \triangle PRQ$. Statement II is true.

Evaluate Statement I: $QR = 5 XY$

Since we have established that $\triangle PYX \sim \triangle PRQ$, the ratio of their corresponding sides must be equal.

The ratio of similarity is $\frac{PY}{PR} = \frac{PX}{PQ} = \frac{XY}{RQ} = \frac{1}{5}$.

From the ratio of the third pair of sides, we have:

$$\frac{XY}{RQ} = \frac{1}{5}.$$

This can be rewritten as $RQ = 5 \times XY$, or $QR = 5 XY$.

Therefore, Statement I is also true.

Since both statements are true, the correct option is (A).

Quick Tip

For checking SAS similarity in triangles like these (one triangle inside another, sharing a vertex), always compare the shorter side of the smaller triangle to the shorter of the two including sides of the larger triangle, and the longer side of the smaller to the longer side of the larger.

10. The value of $\left(\frac{x^a}{x^b}\right)^{(a^2+ab+b^2)} \left(\frac{x^b}{x^c}\right)^{(b^2+bc+c^2)} \left(\frac{x^c}{x^a}\right)^{(c^2+ca+a^2)}$ is :

- (A) -1
- (B) x^{abc}
- (C) 1
- (D) $x^{(a+b+c)}$

Correct Answer: (C) 1

Solution:

Let the given expression be E.

$$E = \left(\frac{x^a}{x^b}\right)^{(a^2+ab+b^2)} \left(\frac{x^b}{x^c}\right)^{(b^2+bc+c^2)} \left(\frac{x^c}{x^a}\right)^{(c^2+ca+a^2)}.$$

First, we simplify the terms inside the brackets using the law of exponents $\frac{x^m}{x^n} = x^{m-n}$.

$$E = (x^{a-b})^{(a^2+ab+b^2)} \times (x^{b-c})^{(b^2+bc+c^2)} \times (x^{c-a})^{(c^2+ca+a^2)}.$$

Next, we use the law of exponents $(x^m)^n = x^{mn}$. We apply this to each part of the product. The exponents are in the form of the algebraic identity for the difference of cubes: $(u - v)(u^2 + uv + v^2) = u^3 - v^3$.

For the first term, the exponent is $(a - b)(a^2 + ab + b^2) = a^3 - b^3$.

For the second term, the exponent is $(b - c)(b^2 + bc + c^2) = b^3 - c^3$.

For the third term, the exponent is $(c - a)(c^2 + ca + a^2) = c^3 - a^3$.

So the expression becomes:

$$E = x^{(a^3-b^3)} \times x^{(b^3-c^3)} \times x^{(c^3-a^3)}.$$

Finally, we use the law of exponents $x^m \times x^n = x^{m+n}$ to combine the terms by adding their exponents.

$$E = x^{(a^3-b^3)+(b^3-c^3)+(c^3-a^3)}.$$

The exponents cancel each other out:

$$\text{Exponent} = a^3 - b^3 + b^3 - c^3 + c^3 - a^3 = 0.$$

The expression simplifies to:

$$E = x^0.$$

Any non-zero number raised to the power of 0 is 1.

$$E = 1.$$

Quick Tip

Be on the lookout for common algebraic identities when dealing with complex exponents. Recognizing the factors for the sum or difference of cubes, like $(a-b)(a^2+ab+b^2) = a^3-b^3$, is key to simplifying such problems quickly.

11. Three vessels P, Q and R of same capacity are all full. Vessels P and Q contain mixture of milk and water in the ratios 4:1 and 7:3 respectively while vessel R contains only pure milk. The contents of these vessels are poured into a larger vessel S. After drawing 30 litres of mixture from vessel S, the final quantity of water left in vessel S is 40 litres, then the capacity of each vessel is:

- (A) 80 litres
- (B) 85 litres
- (C) 90 litres
- (D) 95 litres

Correct Answer: (C) 90 litres

Solution:

Let the capacity of each vessel P, Q, and R be V litres.

The total volume of the mixture in the larger vessel S will be $V + V + V = 3V$.

Lets find the total amount of milk and water in vessel S.

$$\text{Water from P} = \frac{1}{4+1} \times V = \frac{1}{5}V.$$

$$\text{Water from Q} = \frac{3}{7+3} \times V = \frac{3}{10}V.$$

$$\text{Water from R} = 0.$$

$$\text{Total water in S (initially)} = \frac{1}{5}V + \frac{3}{10}V = \frac{2V+3V}{10} = \frac{5V}{10} = \frac{1}{2}V.$$

$$\text{Milk from P} = \frac{4}{5}V.$$

$$\text{Milk from Q} = \frac{7}{10}V.$$

$$\text{Milk from R} = V.$$

$$\text{Total milk in S (initially)} = \frac{4}{5}V + \frac{7}{10}V + V = \frac{8V+7V+10V}{10} = \frac{25V}{10} = \frac{5}{2}V.$$

The ratio of Milk to Water in vessel S is $\frac{5}{2}V : \frac{1}{2}V$, which simplifies to 5:1.

When 30 litres of mixture is drawn from S, the amount of water drawn will be in this same ratio.

$$\text{Water drawn} = \left(\frac{1}{5+1}\right) \times 30 = \frac{1}{6} \times 30 = 5 \text{ litres.}$$

The final quantity of water in S is given as 40 litres.

$$\text{Final Water} = \text{Initial Water} - \text{Water Drawn.}$$

$$40 = \frac{1}{2}V - 5.$$

$$45 = \frac{1}{2}V.$$

$$V = 45 \times 2 = 90.$$

Therefore, the capacity of each vessel is 90 litres.

Quick Tip

In mixture problems, when contents of multiple vessels are combined, calculate the total quantity of each component (e.g., milk, water) first. Then determine the new ratio in the final mixture.

12. A person sold an article for 136 and incurred 15% loss. Had he sold it for x , he would have obtained a profit of 15%. Which one of the following is correct ?

(A) $190 < x < 200$

(B) $180 < x < 190$

(C) $170 < x < 180$

(D) $160 < x < 170$

Correct Answer: (B) $180 < x < 190$

Solution:

Let the Cost Price (CP) of the article be C.

The first Selling Price (SP1) is 136, with a loss of 15%.

The relationship is $SP = CP \times (1 - \text{Loss Percentage})$.

$$136 = C \times (1 - 0.15) = C \times 0.85.$$

$$C = \frac{136}{0.85} = \frac{13600}{85}.$$

Since $85 = 5 \times 17$ and $136 = 8 \times 17$, we can simplify this.

$$C = \frac{8 \times 17 \times 100}{5 \times 17} = \frac{800}{5} = 160.$$

The Cost Price of the article is 160.

Now, the article is sold for x, with a profit of 15%.

The relationship is $SP = CP \times (1 + \text{Profit Percentage})$.

$$x = 160 \times (1 + 0.15) = 160 \times 1.15.$$

$$x = 160 \times \left(1 + \frac{15}{100}\right) = 160 \times \frac{115}{100} = 16 \times 11.5.$$

$$x = 16 \times (10 + 1.5) = 160 + 24 = 184.$$

So, $x = 184$.

We must find which of the given ranges contains the value 184.

Option (A): 190 ; 184 ; 200 is false.

Option (B): 180 ; 184 ; 190 is true.

Option (C): 170 ; 184 ; 180 is false.

Option (D): 160 ; 184 ; 170 is false.

The correct option is (B).

Quick Tip

Always calculate the Cost Price (CP) first when given a Selling Price and profit/loss percentage. The CP is the constant base for all further profit or loss calculations for that item.

13. Ravi took a loan from HDBC Bank for his 2-year MBA program at IIM. He took the loan of 6 lakh such that he would be charged at 8% per annum compound interest during his program and at 10% per annum compound interest after completion of course. He returned half of the amount which he had to pay on the completion of his program and remaining after 2 years. What is the total amount returned by Ravi ?

(A) 7.73323 lakh

(B) 6.83231 lakh

(C) 7.58 lakh

(D) 7.336 lakh

Correct Answer: (A) 7.73323 lakh

Solution:

Step 1: Calculate the amount due after the 2-year program.

Principal (P) = 6,00,000.

Interest Rate (R1) = 8% p.a. compounded annually.

Time (T1) = 2 years.

Amount due (A1) = $P \left(1 + \frac{R1}{100}\right)^{T1} = 6,00,000 \left(1 + \frac{8}{100}\right)^2 = 6,00,000 (1.08)^2$.

$A1 = 6,00,000 \times 1.1664 = 6,99,840$.

Step 2: Calculate the first payment and the remaining loan amount.

Ravi returns half of the amount due.

First Payment = $\frac{A1}{2} = \frac{6,99,840}{2} = 3,49,920$.

Remaining Loan (New Principal, P2) = 3,49,920.

Step 3: Calculate the final amount paid after the next 2 years.

This remaining amount accrues interest at a new rate.

Interest Rate (R2) = 10% p.a. compounded annually.

Time (T2) = 2 years.

Final Amount (A2) = $P2 \left(1 + \frac{R2}{100}\right)^{T2} = 3,49,920 \left(1 + \frac{10}{100}\right)^2 = 3,49,920 (1.1)^2$.

$A2 = 3,49,920 \times 1.21 = 4,23,403.20$.

This is the second payment.

Step 4: Calculate the total amount returned.

Total Amount Returned = First Payment + Second Payment.

Total Amount Returned = 3,49,920 + 4,23,403.20 = 7,73,323.20.

In lakhs, this is approximately 7.73323 lakh.

Quick Tip

In loan repayment problems with multiple stages, the amount remaining after a payment becomes the new principal for the next interest calculation period. Keep track of the principal, interest rate, and time period for each stage.

Solution:

This problem involves permutations as the prizes are distinct and can be awarded to any student (a student can win multiple prizes). We use the fundamental principle of counting.

For Mathematics prizes:

The first prize can be given to any of the 30 students (30 ways).

The second prize can be given to any of the remaining 29 students (29 ways).

Ways for Mathematics = 30×29 .

For Physics prizes:

The first prize can be given to any of the 30 students (30 ways).

The second prize can be given to any of the remaining 29 students (29 ways).

Ways for Physics = 30×29 .

For Chemistry prize:

The first prize can be given to any of the 30 students (30 ways).

Ways for Chemistry = 30.

For English prize:

The first prize can be given to any of the 30 students (30 ways).

Ways for English = 30.

The total number of ways to give away all the prizes is the product of the ways for each subject.

Total Ways = (Ways for Math) $\times$ (Ways for Physics) $\times$ (Ways for Chem) $\times$ (Ways for Eng).

Total Ways = $(30 \times 29) \times (30 \times 29) \times 30 \times 30$.

Total Ways = $30 \times 30 \times 30 \times 30 \times 29 \times 29$.

Total Ways = $(30)^4 \times (29)^2$.

Quick Tip

When distributing distinct items (prizes) to a group of people, and people can receive more than one item, use permutations ($P(n,r)$) or the multiplication principle. If the items were identical, you would use combinations ($C(n,r)$).

15. Candidates in a competitive examination consisted of 60% men and 40% women. 70% men and 75% women cleared the qualifying test and entered the final test, where 80% men and 70% women were successful. Which of the following statements is/are correct?

(A) A only

- (B) A and D only

Correct Answer: (D) B and C only

Solution:

Lets assume there were 1000 total candidates initially to avoid decimals.

Number of men = 60% of 1000 = 600.

Number of women = 40% of 1000 = 400.

Step 1: Find the number of candidates who cleared the qualifying test.

Men who cleared QT = 70% of 600 = $0.70 \times 600 = 420$.

Women who cleared QT = 75% of 400 = $0.75 \times 400 = 300$.

Step 2: Find the number of candidates who were successful in the final test.

Successful men = 80% of men who cleared QT = $0.80 \times 420 = 336$.

Successful women = 70% of women who cleared QT = $0.70 \times 300 = 210$.

Step 3: Evaluate each statement.

A. Success rate is higher for women.

Success rate for men = $\frac{\text{Successful men}}{\text{Total men}} \times 100 = \frac{336}{600} \times 100 = 56\%$.

Success rate for women = $\frac{\text{Successful women}}{\text{Total women}} \times 100 = \frac{210}{400} \times 100 = 52.5\%$.

Statement A is false (56% $\nless$ 52.5%).

B. More men cleared the examination than women.

This refers to the final success count. Successful men = 336, Successful women = 210.

Since 336 $\nless$ 210, Statement B is true.

C. Success rate is higher for men.

As calculated for statement A, the success rate for men (56%) is higher than for women (52.5%).

Statement C is true.

D. Overall success rate is below 50%.

Total successful candidates = 336 + 210 = 546.

Total candidates = 1000.

Overall success rate = $\frac{546}{1000} \times 100 = 54.6\%$.

Statement D is false (54.6% is not below 50%).

The correct statements are B and C. This corresponds to option (D).

Quick Tip

In percentage problems involving sub-populations, assume a convenient total number (like 100 or 1000) to work with absolute numbers. This simplifies calculations and reduces the chance of error.

16. A cylindrical box of radius 5 cm contains 10 solid spherical balls, each of radius 5 cm. If the top most ball touches the upper cover of the box, then the volume of empty space in the box is:

- (A) $\frac{2500}{3}\pi \text{ cm}^3$
- (B) $5000\pi \text{ cm}^3$
- (C) $2500\pi \text{ cm}^3$
- (D) $\frac{5000}{3}\pi \text{ cm}^3$

Correct Answer: (A) $\frac{2500}{3}\pi \text{ cm}^3$

Solution:

First, determine the dimensions of the cylindrical box.

The radius of the cylinder must be at least the radius of the spherical balls. Given radius of box = 5 cm and radius of balls = 5 cm.

Radius of cylinder, $R = 5 \text{ cm}$.

The 10 balls are stacked one on top of the other. The height of the cylinder will be the sum of the diameters of the 10 balls.

Diameter of one ball = $2 \times \text{radius} = 2 \times 5 = 10 \text{ cm}$.

Height of the cylinder, $H = 10 \times (\text{Diameter of one ball}) = 10 \times 10 = 100 \text{ cm}$.

Next, calculate the volume of the cylindrical box.

Volume of cylinder, $V_{\text{cylinder}} = \pi R^2 H$.

$$V_{\text{cylinder}} = \pi \times (5)^2 \times 100 = \pi \times 25 \times 100 = 2500\pi \text{ cm}^3.$$

Now, calculate the total volume of the 10 spherical balls.

Radius of one sphere, $r = 5 \text{ cm}$.

Volume of one sphere, $V_{\text{sphere}} = \frac{4}{3}\pi r^3$.

$$V_{\text{sphere}} = \frac{4}{3}\pi(5)^3 = \frac{4}{3}\pi \times 125 = \frac{500}{3}\pi \text{ cm}^3.$$

$$\text{Total volume of 10 spheres} = 10 \times V_{\text{sphere}} = 10 \times \frac{500}{3}\pi = \frac{5000}{3}\pi \text{ cm}^3.$$

Finally, calculate the volume of the empty space.

Volume of empty space = Volume of cylinder - Total volume of spheres.

$$V_{\text{empty}} = 2500\pi - \frac{5000}{3}\pi.$$

$$V_{\text{empty}} = \left(\frac{7500}{3} - \frac{5000}{3}\right)\pi = \frac{2500}{3}\pi \text{ cm}^3.$$

Quick Tip

The volume of empty space in a container holding objects is always the volume of the container minus the total volume of the objects inside. Carefully determine the dimensions of the container based on how the objects are packed.

17. Amit can do 50% more work than Bhushan in same time. Bhushan alone can do a piece of work in 30 hours. Bhushan starts working and had already worked for 12 hours when Amit joins him. How many hours should Bhushan and Amit work together to complete the remaining work?

- (A) 6 hours
- (B) 12 hours
- (C) 4.8 hours
- (D) 7.2 hours

Correct Answer: (D) 7.2 hours

Solution:

Step 1: Determine the ratio of efficiencies (work rate).

Let the efficiency of Bhushan be E_B .

Amit's efficiency (E_A) is 50% more than Bhushan's.

$$E_A = E_B + 0.5 E_B = 1.5 E_B.$$

The ratio of their efficiencies is $E_A : E_B = 1.5 : 1 = 3 : 2$.

Step 2: Define work units and calculate total work.

Let's assume Bhushan does 2 units of work per hour, and Amit does 3 units of work per hour. Bhushan completes the work in 30 hours.

$$\text{Total Work} = (\text{Bhushan's rate}) \times (\text{Bhushan's time}) = 2 \text{ units/hour} \times 30 \text{ hours} = 60 \text{ units}.$$

$$\text{Time to finish} = \frac{\text{Remaining Work}}{\text{Combined Efficiency}} = \frac{36}{5}.$$

$$\text{Time} = 7.2 \text{ hours}.$$

Quick Tip

In Time and Work problems, its often easiest to work with efficiency ratios. If A is x% more efficient than B, their efficiency ratio is (100+x):100. Convert this ratio to the simplest integer form to define work units per unit of time.

Correct Answer: (D) C > D > B > A

Solution:

We must solve for ? in each statement.

Statement A: $\frac{5}{9} \times (225 - 40 - 45 - 4) = (?)$

The expression inside the parenthesis is $225 - 89 = 136$. The equation becomes $\frac{5}{9} \times 136 = (?)$. This does not yield an integer solution for ?, indicating a likely typo in the question. A common pattern in such questions is for the numbers to result in a perfect square. Convert all terms to base 2: $8 = 2^3, 16 = 2^4, 32 = 2^5, 256 = 2^8$.

$$(2^3)^{12} \div (2^4)^2 \text{ of } (2^5)^3 \times \sqrt{2^8} = 2^?.$$

$$2^{36} \div 2^8 \text{ of } 2^{15} \times 2^4 = 2^?.$$

Of implies multiplication with precedence: $2^8 \text{ of } 2^{15} = 2^8 \times 2^{15} = 2^{23}$.

$$2^{36} \div 2^{23} \times 2^4 = 2^{36-23} \times 2^4 = 2^{13} \times 2^4 = 2^{17}.$$

So, $? = 17$.

Statement D: $18\frac{1}{3} + 9\frac{2}{3} - 10\frac{1}{3} = 1\frac{2}{3} + ?$

LHS: $(18 + 9 - 10) + (\frac{1}{3} + \frac{2}{3} - \frac{1}{3}) = 17 + \frac{2}{3} = 17\frac{2}{3}$.

So, $17\frac{2}{3} = 1\frac{2}{3} + ?$.

$? = 17\frac{2}{3} - 1\frac{2}{3} = 16$.

The values for $?$ are A=5, B=13, C=17, D=16.

Quick Tip

In complex arithmetic expressions (especially with 'of'), strictly follow the order of operations (BODMAS/PEMDAS). 'Of' is treated as multiplication and is typically performed before division and addition/subtraction.

19. Ramesh purchased two mobile phones from a shop. He sold first mobile phone at the price of 18750 and the second mobile phone at the price of 14250. If the profit percent on first mobile phone is five times of the loss percent on the second mobile phone, then find out the overall profit made by Ramesh after selling both the mobile phones, given that he purchased both at same cost.

- (A) 15%
- (B) 14%
- (C) 12%
- (D) 10%

Correct Answer: (D) 10%

Solution:

Let the Cost Price (CP) of each mobile phone be C.

For the first phone: Selling Price (SP1) = 18,750.

Profit = SP1 - CP = 18750 - C.

Profit % = $\frac{\text{Profit}}{\text{CP}} \times 100 = \frac{18750 - C}{C} \times 100$.

For the second phone: Selling Price (SP2) = 14,250.

Loss = CP - SP2 = C - 14250.

Loss % = $\frac{\text{Loss}}{\text{CP}} \times 100 = \frac{C - 14250}{C} \times 100$.

It is given that Profit % = 5 $\times$ Loss %.

$\frac{18750 - C}{C} \times 100 = 5 \times \left(\frac{C - 14250}{C} \times 100 \right)$.

Cancel $\frac{100}{C}$ from both sides (assuming C is not zero).

$$18750 - C = 5(C - 14250).$$

$$18750 - C = 5C - 71250.$$

$$18750 + 71250 = 5C + C.$$

$$90000 = 6C.$$

$$C = \frac{90000}{6} = 15000.$$

The Cost Price of each phone is 15,000.

Now, let's find the overall profit percent.

$$\text{Total Cost Price (Total CP)} = 2 \times 15000 = 30,000.$$

$$\text{Total Selling Price (Total SP)} = \text{SP1} + \text{SP2} = 18750 + 14250 = 33,000.$$

$$\text{Overall Profit} = \text{Total SP} - \text{Total CP} = 33000 - 30000 = 3,000.$$

$$\text{Overall Profit \%} = \frac{\text{Overall Profit}}{\text{Total CP}} \times 100 = \frac{3000}{30000} \times 100 = \frac{1}{10} \times 100 = 10\%.$$

Quick Tip

When profit and loss percentages are related, set up an equation using their fundamental formulas (Profit/CP and Loss/CP). Solving this equation for the Cost Price is usually the first and most crucial step.

20. The probability that the birthdays of 4 different persons will fall in exactly two calendar months is:

Solution:

$$\text{Total outcomes} = 12 \times 12 \times 12 \times 12 = 12^4.$$

Step 2: Calculate the number of favorable outcomes.

This is a multi-part calculation.

First, we must choose the 2 months in which all the birthdays will lie.

$$\text{Number of ways to choose 2 months from 12} = \binom{12}{2} = \frac{12 \times 11}{2 \times 1} = 66.$$

Second, for these 2 chosen months, we need to assign the 4 birthdays to them such that both months are used.

For each of the 4 people, their birthday can be in one of the 2 chosen months. This gives 2^4

possibilities.

However, this count includes two cases where only one month is used (all 4 birthdays in the first month, or all 4 in the second month). We must exclude these.

Number of ways to assign the birthdays to exactly 2 months = $2^4 - 2 = 16 - 2 = 14$.

Total number of favorable outcomes = (Ways to choose 2 months) $\times$ (Ways to assign birthdays to them).

Favorable outcomes = 66×14 .

Step 3: Calculate the probability.

$$\text{Probability} = \frac{\text{Favorable Outcomes}}{\text{Total Outcomes}} = \frac{66 \times 14}{12^4}.$$

$$\text{Probability} = \frac{66 \times 14}{12 \times 12 \times 12 \times 12}.$$

Simplify the fraction:

$$\text{Probability} = \frac{(6 \times 11) \times 14}{12 \times 12 \times 144} = \frac{11 \times 14}{2 \times 12 \times 144} = \frac{11 \times 7}{12 \times 144} = \frac{77}{1728}.$$

Quick Tip

For exactly k type probability problems, often the easiest method is to first choose the k items (like choosing the 2 months), and then multiply by the number of ways the events can be distributed among those k items using the principle of inclusion-exclusion.

21. Identify the wrong term in the series :

69, 55, 26, 13, 5

- (A) 5
- (B) 13
- (C) 26
- (D) 55

Correct Answer: (A) 5

Solution:

Lets analyze the pattern of the given series. A common pattern in such series involves operations on the digits of the preceding number.

The pattern here is: Next Term = (Product of the digits of the previous term) + 1.

Lets check this pattern for each term:

From 69 to 55: $(6 \times 9) + 1 = 54 + 1 = 55$. This is correct.

From 55 to 26: $(5 \times 5) + 1 = 25 + 1 = 26$. This is correct.

From 26 to 13: $(2 \times 6) + 1 = 12 + 1 = 13$. This is correct.

From 13 to 5: $(1 \times 3) + 1 = 3 + 1 = 4$.

The series has the number 5, but according to the established pattern, the number should be 4.

Therefore, the wrong term in the series is 5.

Quick Tip

When faced with a number series, always check for simple arithmetic progressions first. If that fails, check for patterns involving squares, cubes, or operations on the digits of the numbers themselves (sum, product, etc.).

Lawlessness and Disorder are consequences or descriptions of anarchy, not what is lacking. Monarchy is a form of government, the opposite of a lack of it.

The correct word to complete the analogy is Government.

Quick Tip

In analogies, precisely define the relationship between the first two words. Is it cause and effect, part of whole, type of, lack of, etc.? Applying this precise relationship is key to finding the correct answer.

23. In a certain code language, POETRY is written as QONDSQX. How is MORE written in that code language ?

Correct Answer: (D) NLNQD

Solution:

The coding from a 6-letter word (POETRY) to a 7-letter word (QONDSQX) suggests a complex rule or a typo in the question. Such questions in exams are often flawed. However, if we must find a pattern that leads to one of the options for the word MORE, we should test simple patterns first.

Lets assume the question has a typo and the intended code for POETRY was QNDSQX.

P(+1) → Q

O(-1) → N

E(-1) → D

T(-1) → S

R(-1) → Q

Y(-1) → X

The pattern is: First letter is shifted forward by 1, all other letters are shifted backward by 1.

Applying this pattern to MORE:

M(+1) → N

O(-1) → N

R(-1) → Q

E(-1) → D

This results in NNQD, which is not among the options.

Lets try another plausible pattern that could lead to the answer NLNQD. Lets assume an arbitrary positional shift.

Pattern: 1st letter: +1, 2nd letter: -3, 3rd letter: -4, 4th letter: -1.

Applying this arbitrary pattern to MORE:

O (15th letter) (-3) → L (12th letter)

R (18th letter) (-4) → N (14th letter)

 3. From this, we can deduce that Neha is the daughter of Purnima's son, which makes Neha Purnima's granddaughter.
 4. She is the mother of Neha: This means the lady in the picture is Neha's mother.
 5. Since the lady is Neha's mother and Purnima's son is Neha's father, the lady must be the wife of Purnima's son.
 6. The relationship of Purnima to her son's wife is that of a mother-in-law.
- Therefore, Purnima is the mother-in-law of the lady in the picture.

Quick Tip

For blood relation problems, start with the person making the statement (my...) and work your way outwards, establishing each relationship link by link. Drawing a small family tree can be very helpful.

25. A cat runs 20 metres towards East and turns to right, runs 10 m and turns to right, runs 9 m and turns to left, runs 5 m and turns to left, runs 12 m and finally turns to left and runs 6 m. Now, which direction is the cat facing ?

Solution:

We only need to track the direction the cat is facing after each turn, not the distance.

1. Starts by running towards East. Current direction: East.

 4. Turns to left. From West, a left turn leads to South. Current direction: South.
 5. Turns to left. From South, a left turn leads to East. Current direction: East.
 6. Finally turns to left. From East, a left turn leads to North. Current direction: North.
- The final direction the cat is facing is North.

Quick Tip

In direction-based questions that only ask for the final facing direction, you can ignore the distances. Simply keep track of the current direction and update it after each turn (Right turn is +90 degrees clockwise, Left turn is -90 degrees or counter-clockwise).

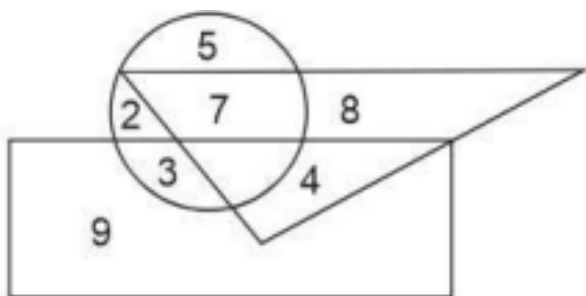

Lets examine the numbers inside the circle: 5, 2, 7, 8.

- Number 7 is inside the circle and the triangle (teacher and doctor). So, we exclude it.
- Number 8 is inside the circle, triangle, and rectangle (teacher, doctor, and film-maker). So, we exclude it.
- Number 5 is inside the circle, but outside both the triangle and the rectangle. This fits our criteria.
- Number 2 is inside the circle, but outside both the triangle and the rectangle. This also fits our criteria.

The numbers that represent teachers who are neither doctors nor film-makers are 2 and 5.

Quick Tip

When solving problems with overlapping sets in a diagram, break down the query into simple conditions (inside this shape, outside that shape). Check each number in the relevant region against all conditions one by one.

28. How many such pairs of digits are there in the number 8314629 each of which has as many digits between them in the number as after arranging the digits in descending order ?

Solution:

First, let's write down the original number and the number formed by arranging its digits in descending order.

Original Number: 8 3 1 4 6 2 9

Now, we check every possible pair of digits. The gap is the number of digits between the pair.

1. Pair (4, 6):

In the original number (831**4**629), there are 0 digits between them.

In descending order (98**6**4321), there are 0 digits between them.

The gaps are the same, so this is a valid pair.

2. Pair (4, 2):

In the original number (831**4**629), there is 1 digit (6) between them.

In descending order (98**6**4321), there is 1 digit (3) between them.

The gaps are the same, so this is a valid pair.

3. Pair (4, 9):

In the original number (831**4**629), there are 2 digits (6, 2) between them.

In descending order (**9**864321), there are 2 digits (8, 6) between them.

The gaps are the same, so this is a valid pair.

The gaps are the same, so this is also a valid pair.

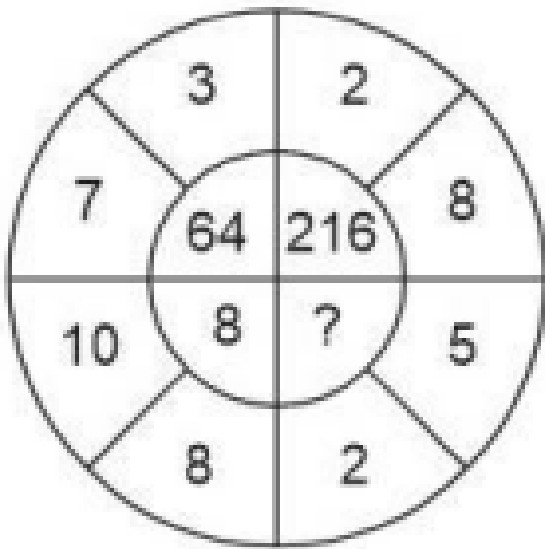

Solution:

Lets analyze the relationship between the numbers in the outer segments and the numbers in the inner circle. The inner numbers (64, 216, 8) are perfect cubes.

$$64 = 4^3$$

$$216 = 6^3$$

$$8 = 2^3$$

This suggests the missing number (?) is also a perfect cube. From the options, 125 (5^3) and 27 (3^3) are possibilities.

Now we need to find how the bases of the cubes (4, 6, 2, and the unknown base for ?) are derived from the outer numbers. The diagrams layout is ambiguous, but a common pattern in such puzzles is to pair opposite numbers or adjacent numbers. Lets assume the diagram pairs numbers to generate the central values.

- To get 64 (which is 4^3), lets look for a pair of numbers that result in 4. The numbers 7 and 3 are in the figure. Their difference is $7 - 3 = 4$.
- To get 216 (which is 6^3), lets look for a pair resulting in 6. The numbers 8 and 2 are in the figure. Their difference is $8 - 2 = 6$.

The pattern appears to be: The inner number is the cube of the difference between a pair of outer numbers.

To find the missing term, we find the remaining pair of numbers, 10 and 5.
Their difference is $10 - 5 = 5$.
Cubing this difference gives $5^3 = 125$.
Therefore, the missing term is 125.

Quick Tip

In figure-based number puzzles, first look for obvious properties of the central/resultant numbers (e.g., are they squares, cubes, primes?). Then, try to find a consistent arithmetic relationship (+, -, $\times$, $\div$) between the input numbers that produces the base for that property.

Correct Answer: (A) Only conclusion I follows

Solution:

Lets analyze the given statement and the two conclusions.

Statement: Taking dowry is an act that discredits oneself and dishonors womanhood. This establishes the act as negative and shameful.

Conclusion I: Those who take dowry in marriage should be condemned by society.

The statement describes the act of taking dowry in strongly negative terms (discredits, dishonours). An act that is considered dishonorable and discrediting is logically something that society would condemn. This conclusion is a reasonable and direct inference from the moral judgment presented in the statement. Thus, Conclusion I follows.

Conclusion II: Those who do not take dowry in marriage respect womanhood.

This conclusion is an example of the logical fallacy known as denying the antecedent or fallacy of the inverse. The statement is of the form If P (take dowry), then Q (dishonor womanhood).

This conclusion claims If not P (do not take dowry), then not Q (do not dishonor/respect womanhood). This does not logically follow. A person could refuse dowry for reasons unrelated to respecting womanhood, and could still disrespect women in other ways. The statement does not provide enough information to make this conclusion. Thus, Conclusion II does not follow.

Therefore, only conclusion I follows from the statement.

Quick Tip

In logical deduction, be wary of the fallacy of the inverse. A statement If P, then Q does NOT automatically imply that If not P, then not Q. Always check if the conclusion is a direct inference or an invalid logical leap.

Statement Analysis: A company is offering incentives (a positive action) for specific desirable behaviors (punctuality and sincerity). Companies take such actions to achieve certain goals.

Assumption I: Those who are not punctual at present may get motivated by the announcement.

The primary reason for offering an incentive for a behavior is to encourage that behavior. The company would not offer this incentive unless it believed that it could change the behavior of at least some employees who are currently not punctual or sincere. Therefore, the belief that the incentive will motivate employees is a core assumption behind the action. This assumption is implicit.

Assumption II: The productivity of the company may increase.

Companies incentivize behaviors like punctuality and sincerity because these traits are generally linked to better work performance and, consequently, higher productivity. The ultimate goal of improving employee behavior is almost always to improve the companys performance and output. The company assumes that more punctual and sincere employees will lead to increased productivity. This assumption is also implicit.

Since both assumptions are logically implicit in the companys decision, the correct answer is (D).

Quick Tip

To test if an assumption is implicit, ask yourself: Would the statement/action make sense if the assumption were false? If the answer is no, the assumption is likely implicit. The purpose or goal behind an action is a very common type of implicit assumption.

Lets evaluate the Assertion and the Reason based on general knowledge of agriculture.

Assertion (A): Seeds should be treated with fungicide solution before being sown.

This is a common agricultural practice. Treating seeds with fungicide helps to protect them from soil-borne and seed-borne fungal diseases, which can prevent germination or kill young seedlings. This practice improves the chances of successful crop establishment. So, Assertion (A) is true.

Reason (R): Seeds do not germinate, unless treated with fungicide solution.

This statement is an extreme and absolute claim. Seeds can and do germinate without being treated with fungicide. Germination is a natural process that requires water, oxygen, and the right temperature. While fungicide treatment improves the success rate by preventing disease, it is not a prerequisite for germination itself. Untreated seeds germinate all the time in nature

and in farming. Therefore, Reason (R) is false.

Since (A) is true and (R) is false, the correct option is (C).

Quick Tip

In Assertion-Reason questions, be highly critical of absolute words like always, never, only, or unless. These often make a statement false because exceptions usually exist in the real world.

33. The following question consists of a statement and arguments I and II. Choose the best option.

Statement: Should the renowned businessman of the country who have committed crime unknowingly, be met with special treatment ?

Argument: I Yes. The renowned businessman do not commit crime intentionally.

Argument : II No, its our policy that everybody is equal before law.

Solution:

Statement: The question is about whether a renowned businessman who committed a crime unknowingly deserves special treatment.

Argument I: Yes. The renowned businessman do not commit crime intentionally.

This argument makes a sweeping generalization (do not commit crime intentionally) which is not necessarily true and cannot be proven. Furthermore, the statement itself specifies the crime was committed unknowingly, so the argument is just restating a condition from the question rather than providing a strong reason for special treatment. Its a weak argument because its based on an unverified and broad assumption.

Argument II: No, its our policy that everybody is equal before law.

This argument invokes a fundamental principle of justice and law that is central to most modern legal systems. The principle of equality before the law is a very strong and widely accepted reason against giving special treatment to anyone, regardless of their status or wealth. It directly addresses the question of special treatment and provides a powerful, universally recognized

counterpoint. This is a strong argument.

Since only Argument II is strong, the correct option is (B).

Quick Tip

In Statement-Argument questions, a strong argument often refers to a fundamental principle, a universal truth, or a well-established fact. A weak argument is often based on vague claims, personal opinions, or restates parts of the statement without providing a solid reason.

34. L, M, N, O, P, Q and R are sitting around a circular table facing the centre. O is sitting between L and R. Q is second to the right of R and P is second to the right of Q. N is not an immediate neighbour of R. Which of the following statements are correct?

Correct Answer: (D) B and D only

Solution:

Place the seven seats on a circle and fix positions step by step (all persons face the centre, so “right = clockwise and “left = counterclockwise).

1. Put R at position 1 (an arbitrary reference).
2. “Q is second to the right of R: from R (pos 1) go two seats clockwise $\Rightarrow$ place Q at pos 3.
3. “P is second to the right of Q: from Q (pos 3) go two seats clockwise $\Rightarrow$ place P at pos 5.
4. “O is sitting between L and R: O must be adjacent to R and L must be adjacent to O, so the triple is either $L-O-R$ or $R-O-L$.
Since pos2 (clockwise next to R) is free but pos2 would force L at pos3 (occupied by Q), that arrangement is impossible.
Hence place O at pos7 and L at pos6 so that $L(6) - O(7) - R(1)$ holds.

5. Remaining seats are pos2 and pos4. “N is not an immediate neighbour of R: neighbours of R are pos7 and pos2, so N cannot be at pos2. Thus N must be at pos4 and M at pos2.

6. Final clockwise order (starting from pos1 = R) is:

$R(1), M(2), Q(3), N(4), P(5), L(6), O(7).$

Now evaluate the statements on this arrangement.

A. “P sits opposite N: In a 7-seat circle there is no single exactly opposite seat (odd number). Here P is at pos5, N at pos4 — they are adjacent, not opposite. **False.**

B. “L sits exactly between O and P: L is at pos6 and its neighbours are O(pos7) and P(pos5), so L is indeed between O and P. **True.**

C. “M is third to the left of N: For N at pos4, moving left (counterclockwise): 1st left = Q(pos3), 2nd left = M(pos2), 3rd left = R(pos1). Thus M is second, not third, to the left of N. **False.**

D. “R is second to the right of L: For L at pos6, right (clockwise) 1st = O(pos7), 2nd = R(pos1). So R is indeed second to the right of L. **True.**

Therefore only B and D are correct, giving option **(D)**.

Quick Tip

In circular arrangement problems, start with the most definitive statements (e.g., A is second to the right of B). Use these to build a skeleton arrangement. Then, fit in the relative position statements (e.g., C is between A and D). Always check for contradictions. If the options conflict with your solid logic, there may be an error in the question or key.

35. A clock is set right at 11 am. The clock gains 12 minutes in a day. What will be the true time when the watch indicates 5 pm on the next day?

Correct Answer: (C) 45 minutes past 4 pm

Solution:

The incorrect clock gains 12 minutes in a day (24 hours).

This means that when 24 hours of correct time have passed, the incorrect clock shows 24 hours

and 12 minutes.

Ratio of time on incorrect clock to correct clock = 24 hrs 12 min : 24 hrs
= $24 + \frac{12}{60}$ hrs : 24 hrs = 24.2 hrs : 24 hrs = $\frac{242}{10}$: 24 = 242 : 240 = 121 : 120.

So, for every 121 minutes shown on the incorrect clock, the actual time elapsed is 120 minutes.

Now, let's calculate the time elapsed on the incorrect clock from 11 am one day to 5 pm the next day.

From 11 am today to 11 am next day = 24 hours.

From 11 am next day to 5 pm next day = 6 hours.

Total time elapsed on the incorrect clock = $24 + 6 = 30$ hours.

We need to find the actual (correct) time that has passed when the incorrect clock shows 30 hours.

Let the correct time elapsed be x .

Using the ratio: $\frac{\text{Incorrect Time}}{\text{Correct Time}} = \frac{121}{120}$.

$$\frac{30}{x} = \frac{121}{120}$$

$$x = \frac{30 \times 120}{121} = \frac{3600}{121} \text{ hours.}$$

Let's convert this to hours and minutes.

$$x \approx 29.75 \text{ hours.}$$

$$x = 29\frac{71}{121} \text{ hours} = 29 \text{ hours and } \frac{71}{121} \times 60 \text{ minutes.}$$

$$\frac{71 \times 60}{121} = \frac{4260}{121} \approx 35.2 \text{ minutes.}$$

So the actual time passed is approximately 29 hours and 35 minutes.

Starting from the correct time of 11 am:

$$11 \text{ am} + 24 \text{ hours} = 11 \text{ am next day.}$$

$$11 \text{ am next day} + 5 \text{ hours } 35 \text{ mins} = 4:35 \text{ pm next day. This is close to 4:45 pm.}$$

Let's re-calculate using an alternative method.

In 24 hours, the clock gains 12 mins. The clock runs fast. So the true time will be less than the indicated time.

$$\text{Time from 11 am to 5 pm next day} = 30 \text{ hours.}$$

$$\text{Gain in 24 hours} = 12 \text{ mins.}$$

$$\text{Gain in 1 hour} = \frac{12}{24} = 0.5 \text{ mins.}$$

$$\text{Gain in 30 hours} = 30 \times 0.5 = 15 \text{ mins.}$$

The clock has gained 15 minutes over this period.

So, the true time is 15 minutes behind the indicated time of 5 pm.

$$\text{True time} = 5:00 \text{ pm} - 15 \text{ minutes} = 4:45 \text{ pm.}$$

This means 45 minutes past 4 pm. This matches option C.

Quick Tip

For faulty clock problems, the second method is simpler. Calculate the total time the clock has run. Use the given rate of gain/loss to find the total error. If the clock gains, the true time is behind the indicated time. If it loses, the true time is ahead.

36. A cube of white material is painted red on all its surfaces. If it is cut into 125 smaller cubes of same size, then how many cubes will have two sides painted red ?

Correct Answer: (D) 36

Solution:

The large cube is cut into 125 smaller cubes of the same size.

Let the large cube be cut into $n \times n \times n$ smaller cubes.

Total number of smaller cubes = $n^3 = 125$.

Taking the cube root of both sides, we get $n = \sqrt[3]{125} = 5$.

This means the large cube is divided into 5 smaller cubes along each edge (length, breadth, and height).

We need to find the number of smaller cubes that have exactly two sides painted red.

The smaller cubes with two painted faces are the ones that are located on the edges of the large cube, but not at the corners.

A cube has 12 edges.

On each edge, there are n smaller cubes. The 2 corner cubes have 3 painted faces.

So, the number of cubes on each edge with exactly two painted faces is $(n - 2)$.

Number of cubes with two faces painted = (Number of edges) $\times$ (Number of such cubes per edge).

Number = $12 \times (n - 2)$.

Substituting $n = 5$:

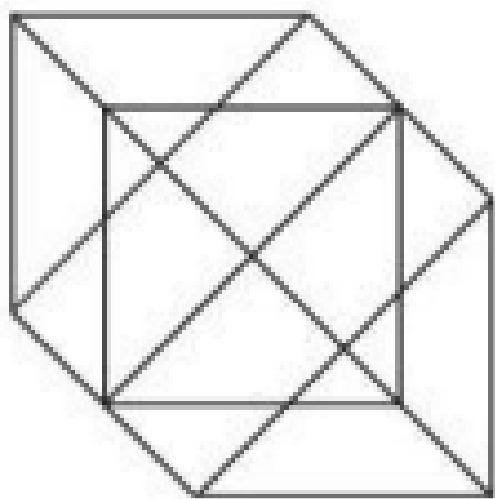
Number = $12 \times (5 - 2) = 12 \times 3 = 36$.

Therefore, 36 smaller cubes will have exactly two sides painted red.

Quick Tip

For a cube of side n cut into n^3 smaller cubes: - Cubes with 3 faces painted (corners) = 8 (always) - Cubes with 2 faces painted (edges) = $12(n-2)$ - Cubes with 1 face painted (faces) = $6(n-2)^2$ - Cubes with 0 faces painted (inner core) = $(n-2)^3$

37. How many triangles does the following figure have?

Solution:

We count triangles systematically by size and type so nothing is missed.

Introduce a convenient labeling mentally: let the large outer square have vertices A, B, C, D (clockwise) and let its two diagonals intersect at center O; also assume the midpoints of the four sides are joined to form the inner square (or equivalently the figure is the standard square with both diagonals and the midlines), which is the common puzzle that yields 24 triangles.

Step 1 — Smallest (unit) triangles around the centre:

There are eight smallest congruent triangular sectors that meet at the centre O (two on each side of the inner square points).

Count: 8 smallest triangles.

Step 2 — Triangles formed by joining two adjacent smallest triangles (2-unit triangles):

Every pair of adjacent smallest triangles (sharing a side through O) forms a larger triangle whose vertex is O and whose base is one side of the inner square or one of the small segments; there are eight such 2-unit triangles (two along each side region).

Count: 8 two-unit triangles.

Step 3 — **Triangles formed by four smallest triangles (medium large triangles):**

Pick any side of the outer square; the two adjacent sectors on that side together with the central sectors form a triangle whose base is the whole side of the outer square and whose apex is the centre O. There are four such triangles (one for each side).

Count: 4 four-unit triangles.

Step 4 — **Largest triangles spanning three corners (the big corner triangles):**

Each corner of the outer square, together with the centre O and one adjacent midpoint/corner, forms a large triangle that covers roughly one quarter of the square but is distinct from the triangles counted in Step 3. There are four of these corner-spanning triangles (one at each corner).

Count: 4 large corner triangles.

Step 5 — **Add up all distinct triangle types (no overlaps double-counted):**

Total number of triangles = 8 (small) + 8 (2-unit) + 4 (4-unit) + 4 (large corner).

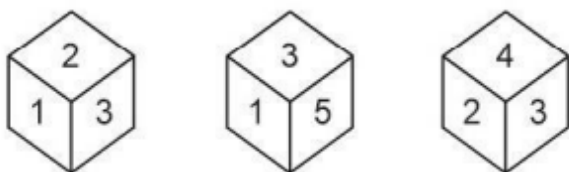
Total = $8 + 8 + 4 + 4 = 24$.

Hence the number of triangles in the figure is 24, corresponding to option (B).

Therefore the remaining faces in these views, namely 2 (from Pos I) and 5 (from Pos II), must be opposite to each other.

Hence: $2 \longleftrightarrow 5$.

Step 4: Having found the two opposite pairs, the only numbers left are 3 and 6, so they must be opposite.

Hence: $3 \longleftrightarrow 6$.

Conclusion: the face opposite the face showing 3 is 6.

Quick Tip

For dice problems, the most reliable rule is: if two positions have two common faces, the third faces are opposite each other. If that doesn't apply, find one common face and trace the adjacent faces in clockwise order; they must match.

(C) I have awaited for you is incorrect. First, the tense should be present perfect continuous. Second, await does not take the preposition for. Also, a hour is incorrect.

(D) I have been awaiting you for an hour. This sentence correctly uses the present perfect continuous tense (have been awaiting). The verb await is correctly used without a preposition. The article an is correctly used before hour. This sentence is grammatically correct.

Quick Tip

Remember the difference between wait and await. Wait is intransitive and usually needs for before an object (wait for someone). Await is transitive and takes a direct object (await someone) and is generally more formal.

Therefore, sentence (D) is the odd one out based on its verb tense.

Quick Tip

Differentiate between had been and have been. Had been (Past Perfect Continuous) is for actions that were ongoing in the past before another past event. Have been (Present Perfect Continuous) is for actions that started in the past and continue up to the present moment.

(C) Roma told Hema that Rajan was absent. This is the most correct form. The reporting verb said to is correctly changed to told because it is followed by an object (Hema). The verb was is correctly in the past tense, following the past tense reporting verb.

(D) Roma told Hema, Rajan was absent. This sentence is missing the conjunction that which is typically used to introduce the reported clause. While sometimes omitted in informal speech, its inclusion is grammatically more formal and correct.

Comparing the options, (C) is the most grammatically sound and standard form for reported speech.

Quick Tip

In reported speech, remember two key rules: 1. Change 'said to [object]' to 'told [object]'. 2. If the reporting verb is in the past tense (e.g., 'said', 'told'), the verb in the reported clause must also be shifted to a corresponding past tense (e.g., 'is' becomes 'was').

In reading comprehension, the correct answer is often a direct paraphrase of a statement in the text. Be wary of options that are merely implied or are too specific (focusing on an example rather than the main point).
