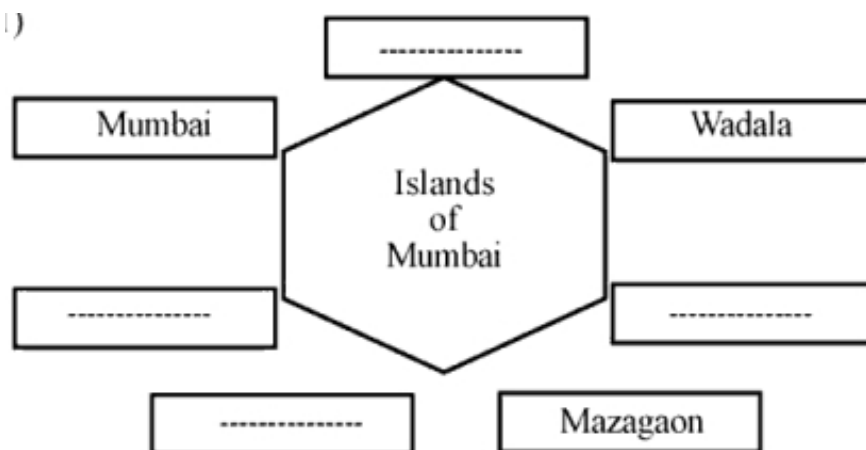

- **Impact of World War II:** The devastation of WWII weakened European powers both economically and politically, reducing their ability to maintain colonies. At the same time, international pressure from institutions like the United Nations and changing global dynamics pushed for decolonisation.
- **Economic and Social Repercussions:** The process of decolonisation often led to challenges,

such as political instability, economic hardship, and the creation of new borders that caused ethnic and political tensions. Despite the challenges, it was a significant moment in global history, leading to the emergence of newly independent nations.

Decolonisation transformed the political landscape of the 20th century, leading to the creation of new nations and the eventual end of colonial empires.
