General Awareness

Solution:

- Cipla is a prominent Indian pharmaceutical company specializing in medicines for respiratory, cardiovascular, and infectious diseases, but it does not produce or market artificial sweeteners.
- Cadila, officially Zydus Cadila (now Zydus Lifesciences), is a leading pharmaceutical and consumer goods company with a diverse portfolio, including the ‘Sugar Free’ brand under its consumer wellness division, targeting diabetic and health-conscious consumers.
- Glaxo, referring to GlaxoSmithKline, is a global pharmaceutical company focused on vaccines and medicines, with no significant presence in the Indian sweetener market.
- Monsanto is a multinational agricultural company specializing in seeds and agrochemicals, not involved in food or sweetener products.

‘Sugar Free’ is a widely recognized artificial sweetener in India, marketed by Zydus Cadila’s consumer division, which focuses on health and wellness products like sugar substitutes. This brand has become synonymous with low-calorie sweeteners in the Indian market.

Cipla, Glaxo, and Monsanto have no documented involvement in the artificial sweetener market in India, making Cadila the only viable choice based on its established product portfolio.

Q2. Monsoon is caused by

Solution:

The question seeks the primary cause of the monsoon, a seasonal weather phenomenon that brings heavy rainfall to India, particularly during the summer months.

- Movements of cloud refer to the visible effects of monsoons, where clouds carry moisture leading to rain, but they are a consequence, not the cause, of the monsoon system.
- Impact of Summer temperature on the sea contributes to monsoon formation by warming ocean waters, creating moisture-laden air, but it is not the primary driver of the monsoon cycle.

- Rise in temperature is a general factor influencing weather patterns but is too vague and not the main cause of the monsoon's onset.
 - Seasonal reversal of winds refers to the shift from dry northeast winds in winter to moist southwest winds in summer, which is the fundamental mechanism driving the Indian monsoon. The Indian monsoon is caused by the seasonal reversal of winds, driven by the movement of the Inter-Tropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ). During summer, the ITCZ shifts northward, pulling moist winds from the Indian Ocean, resulting in heavy rainfall across India. This wind reversal is a hallmark of the monsoon system.
- Cloud movements, sea temperature impacts, and general temperature rises are secondary factors or outcomes of the monsoon, not its primary cause, making seasonal wind reversal the definitive answer.

- Tata Motors is a leading Indian automaker known for its own brands like Tata Indica and the acquisition of Jaguar-Land Rover, but it has no documented manufacturing agreement with Mitsubishi.
- Bajaj Tempo, now known as Force Motors, primarily produces commercial vehicles like tempos and trucks, with no significant partnership with Mitsubishi for passenger car production.
- Mahindra manufactures its own vehicles, such as the Scorpio, and has collaborations with companies like Ford, but there is no record of a manufacturing deal with Mitsubishi.
- Hindustan Motors had a well-established partnership with Mitsubishi, producing vehicles like the Mitsubishi Lancer and Pajero in India, particularly during the 1990s and 2000s. Hindustan Motors collaborated with Mitsubishi to manufacture and assemble vehicles, notably the Mitsubishi Lancer, which gained popularity in India for its reliability and performance. This partnership made Hindustan Motors the primary Indian manufacturer for Mitsubishi vehicles.

Tata Motors, Bajaj Tempo, and Mahindra do not have documented manufacturing agreements

with Mitsubishi, confirming Hindustan Motors as the correct choice.

- Badminton is associated with prominent Indian players like Saina Nehwal and P.V. Sindhu, who have excelled in international tournaments, but not Koneru Humpy.
- Cricket is India’s most popular sport, with stars like Sachin Tendulkar, but Koneru Humpy is not known to be involved in it.
- Chess is the sport where Koneru Humpy has excelled, earning recognition as one of India’s top female grandmasters.
- Weight Lifting is linked to athletes like Karnam Malleswari, India’s first female Olympic medalist, not Koneru Humpy.

Koneru Humpy is a world-renowned chess grandmaster, who became one of the youngest women to achieve the grandmaster title and has competed in world chess championships, representing India globally.

Badminton, cricket, and weight lifting have no connection to Koneru Humpy’s career, making chess the clear and only correct choice.

Q5. The new coin ‘Rupiya’ was issued for the first time by

- Akbar, a Mughal emperor, continued using the Rupiya as a currency but did not originate it, focusing instead on expanding the Mughal economy.
- Ala ud din Khilji, a Delhi Sultanate ruler, implemented market reforms but is not credited with introducing the Rupiya coin.
- Mohammed Shah Tughlaq is known for controversial currency experiments, such as introducing copper coins, but not the silver Rupiya.

Sher Shah Suri introduced the silver Rupiya during his rule (1540–1545), which weighed approximately 11.6 grams and became the precursor to modern Indian currency, influencing coinage for centuries.

Akbar, Ala ud din Khilji, and Mohammed Shah Tughlaq did not introduce the Rupiya, confirming Sher Shah Suri as the correct choice based on historical records.

- Email is a private communication tool used for direct messaging, not for public sharing with an internet community.
- A blog is an online platform where individuals create and publish posts, such as articles or opinions, accessible to a wide audience, ideal for regular sharing.
- Chat involves real-time, often private communication, not suited for structured, ongoing public content sharing with a community.

Blogs are specifically designed for individuals to create, manage, and share content like personal experiences, knowledge, or opinions, making them the ideal platform for engaging with the internet community over time.

Portals, email, and chat do not focus on regular, public content sharing, confirming blogs as the correct and most appropriate choice.

Solution:

- A stem cell pertains to biological research and medical science, completely unrelated to cybersecurity or phishing.
- A fraudulent way of getting the PIN and bank passwords using emails accurately describes phishing, where attackers use deceptive emails to trick users into revealing sensitive information.
- None of these is incorrect since option C provides an accurate definition of phishing.

Phishing is a cybercrime technique where attackers send fake emails, often mimicking trusted entities like banks, to deceive users into providing sensitive data such as PINs, passwords, or credit card details. This method relies on social engineering to exploit trust.

Options A, B, and D do not describe phishing, confirming option C as the precise and correct definition based on its description of fraudulent email tactics.

- Rohan Bopanna and Aisam-Ul-Haq Qureshi are Indian and Pakistani tennis players who formed a successful doubles team, earning the nickname 'Indo-Pak Express' for their cross-border collaboration.
- Sania Mirza and Shahar Peer involve an Indian player and an Israeli player, not Pakistani, ruling out the Indo-Pak nickname.
- Rohan Bopanna and Shahar Peer is an incorrect pairing, as they did not compete together as a team.

The 'Indo-Pak Express' refers to the tennis doubles team of Rohan Bopanna (India) and Aisam-Ul-Haq Qureshi (Pakistan), known for their success in international tournaments and their symbolic partnership fostering India-Pakistan goodwill.

Options A, C, and D do not match the nickname or the India-Pakistan tennis collaboration, confirming Bopanna and Qureshi as the correct choice.

- Monsoon Wedding, directed by Mira Nair in 2001, is a celebrated film exploring Indian family dynamics and weddings, earning international acclaim.
- Kamasutra refers to *Kama Sutra: A Tale of Love*, directed by Mira Nair in 1996, a historical drama exploring love and sensuality.
- Salaam Bombay, directed by Mira Nair in 1988, is her debut feature film, depicting the lives of street children in Mumbai, earning an Oscar nomination.

Earth, directed by Deepa Mehta, is the only film not directed by Mira Nair, as the others are well-known works from her filmography.

Monsoon Wedding, Kamasutra, and Salaam Bombay are all signature films directed by Mira Nair, confirming Earth as the correct choice.

- Cash Rating Ratio is not a standard term in banking or financial terminology.

CRR, or Cash Reserve Ratio, is a critical monetary policy tool used by central banks to control money supply and liquidity in the banking system, requiring banks to maintain a portion of their deposits as cash with the central bank.

Options A, C, and D are either non-existent or unrelated to banking reserve requirements, confirming Cash Reserve Ratio as the precise and correct term.

- TCS–Nielsen refers to a \$2.25 billion outsourcing deal signed by Tata Consultancy Services with Nielsen in 2018 for media measurement and analytics services, a well-documented billion-dollar contract.
- Tech Mahindra–BT involves a multi-billion-dollar deal with British Telecom for IT and network services, supporting BT's global operations, also exceeding \$1 billion.
- Infosys–BN AM O likely refers to a partnership with BNY Mellon (Bank of New York Mellon), but there is no documented billion-dollar deal between Infosys and BNY Mellon in the Indian IT sector.
- IBM–Bharti refers to a \$1 billion+ IT services deal with Bharti Airtel, covering telecom infrastructure and services, a significant contract in the Indian market.

While TCS, Tech Mahindra, and IBM have documented billion-dollar deals, no evidence supports a billion-dollar Infosys-BNY Mellon deal, making it the option that does not fit the

billion-dollar criterion.

Options A, B, and D represent verified billion-dollar IT deals in India, ruling them out and confirming Infosys–BN AM O as the correct choice.

- Birmingham had no documented suicide car bomb incident in 2007 or any other year around that time.
- Nottingham has no record of a car bomb attack at its airport or elsewhere in 2007.

The Glasgow Airport attack involved a burning vehicle crashing into the terminal, an event widely reported as a terrorist incident, making Glasgow the correct location.

Heathrow, Birmingham, and Nottingham airports had no similar incidents in 2007, confirming Glasgow as the only correct choice.

The China-Pakistan FTA, signed in 2006, and the subsequent investments through CPEC, which began planning around that time, make China the correct answer, as it matches both the FTA and investment components.

USA, EU, and Russia lack comparable trade and investment agreements with Pakistan during this period, confirming China as the correct choice.

The Krishna Godavari Basin is India's largest offshore oil and gas field, with major discoveries reported by 2007, including Reliance's KG-D6 block, making it the primary answer.

Cauvery, Rajasthan, and Assam have oil fields but are overshadowed by the scale and significance of the Krishna Godavari Basin's discoveries.

The ionosphere's ionized layers, particularly the F-layer, reflect radio waves, making it critical for long-distance radio communication, a key factor in technologies like amateur radio and broadcasting.

Troposphere, exosphere, and thermosphere do not primarily influence radio wave propagation,

confirming the ionosphere as the correct choice.

- IBM Daksh, acquired by IBM, is a notable BPO provider but smaller in scale compared to Genpact's workforce in India.

Dun and Bradstreet reports from around 2007 often cited Genpact as the largest employer in India's ITeS and BPO sector due to its extensive operations and large employee base across multiple cities.

Accenture, Wipro BPO, and IBM Daksh have significant but smaller BPO workforces compared to Genpact, confirming Genpact as the correct choice.

Narayan Murthy is widely associated with this quote, reflecting his philosophy at Infosys, where data and analytics played a key role in building a global IT services company.

J.R.D. Tata, Aditya Birla, and Dhirubhai Ambani are not linked to this specific data-focused statement, confirming Narayan Murthy as the correct choice.

All this does not mean that the answers which scholars find to their questions have no consequences. They may have enormous consequences but these seldom form the reason for asking the question or pursuing the answers. It is true that scholars can be put to work answering questions for the sake of the consequences as thousands are working now, for example, in search of a cure for cancer. But this is not the primary function of the scholar, for the consequences are usually subordinate to the satisfaction of curiosity.

Besides corneas, scientists have had some success regrowing skin cells and bone tissues, but those procedures remain experimental. “A number of programs around the world have tried to perfect this treatment, but they have had bad outcomes,” says University of Cincinnati eye surgeon and stem cell specialist Edward Holland. “It is impressive what they are doing at Prasad.” In addition to the Hyderabad project, only Holland’s program and a half-dozen others in the world conduct operations using corneas grown from stem cells. The treatment uses stem cells harvested from the limbus, located where the cornea touches the white of the eye. For those with damaged corneas, these cells - called “limbic” and “conjunctiva” - are harvested from a patient’s good eye, if he has one, or from a

close relative. They are placed in a petri dish and chemically tweaked to grow into the lower layer of a cornea, called epithelium. It is then transplanted into the eye of the patient where in most cases it takes hold and grows. In 56% of the cases at the Prasad Institute, patient could still see clearly after 40 months later.

Indians are well known for reverse engineering, meaning they can deduce how drugs are made in order to produce generic versions. But in this case, Sangwan and Vemuganti, a pathologist, developed the technique on their own from reading papers and running experiments in the lab. Sangwan says he had a number of patients with burned eyes who could not be helped with standard corneal transplants from cadavers, so he persuaded Vemuganti to try growing corneas in her lab. "You know how to grow cells, and I know how to do the transplant surgery," Vemuganti recalls him saying. "Why don't we work together?" She smiles and shakes her head. "I had no clue if this was going to work." Vemuganti's major innovation was developing a platform on which to grow corneas. First she designed a circular glass tube about the size of a stack of coins. Then she overlaid the glass with tissue from a human placenta which is "a good surface to grow corneas on." She says. After that she placed stem cells in four places around a circle, added a growth medium, and watched the corneas begin to grow. Commercial interests among stem cell companies for the procedure has been scant because of the perceived small volume of patients, says venture capitalist Antoun Nabhan of Ay Capital, who sits on the board of Cellerant, a leading stem cell company in San Carlos, Calif. But corneal stem cell treatment may have wider applications, says ophthalmologist Ivan Schwab of University of California at Davis. "These stem cells are similar to others in the body that make mucous membrane," he says. "These techniques of growing stem cells might one day be used to treat mucous-membrane tissue in the sinuses, bladder, and other organs."

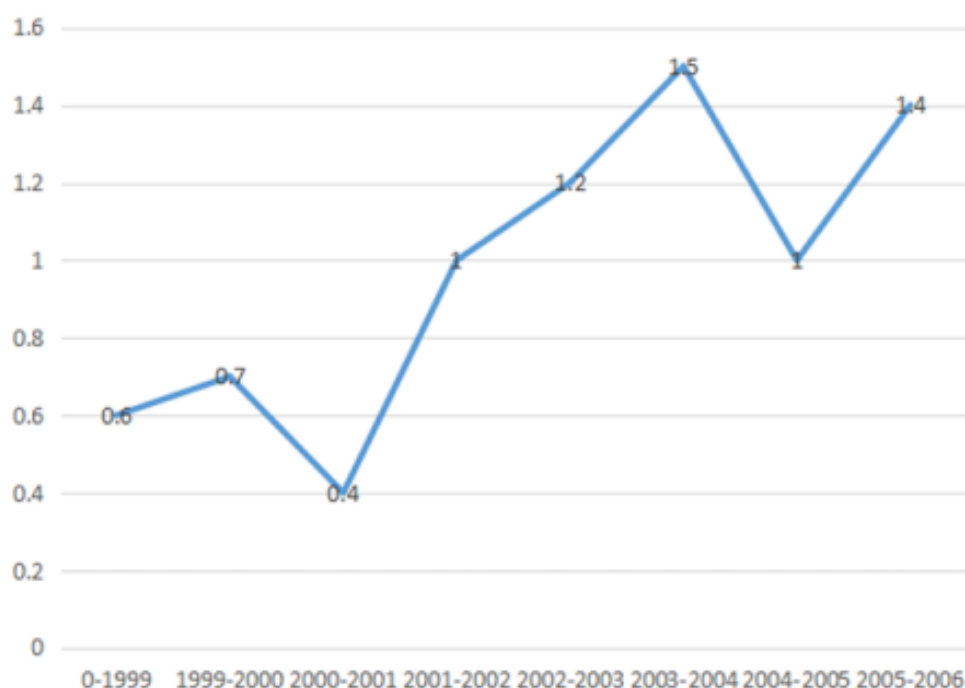

Solution:

From the given line graph, the ratio of wheat production to rice production in the year 2003 is

1.2 : 1.

Given that the rice production in 2003 = 4 lac tons.

Let wheat production = W lac tons. Then,

$$\frac{W}{4} = 1.2 \Rightarrow W = 1.2 \times 4 = 4.8 \text{ lac tons.}$$

Hence, the wheat production during 2003 was **4.8 lac tons**.

 Quick Tip

When dealing with ratio-based questions, always link the given ratio directly with the base quantity. Multiply the known value by the ratio term corresponding to the unknown.

- Statement (2): $S_2 = 4300$. Then $P_2 = 4300 - E_2$, $P_1 = S_1 - E_1$, but without E_1 , E_2 , or S_1 , cannot solve. Insufficient.

- Together: $P_2 = 4300 - 1400 = 2900$, $P_1 = S_1 - 1220$, $P_2 = 1.32P_1 \Rightarrow 2900 = 1.32(S_1 - 1220)$. Solve: $S_1 - 1220 = \frac{2900}{1.32} \approx 2196.97$, $S_1 \approx 3416.97$. Sales increase: $\frac{4300 - 3416.97}{3416.97} \times 100 \approx 25.85\%$. Sufficient.

Both statements together allow calculation, but neither alone does, matching option C.

Options A and B fail as neither statement alone suffices. Option D fails as both together are sufficient.

Hence the speed increased by **75%**.

Managerial: $\frac{48}{15,389} \approx 0.3120\%$.

Managerial proportion $\approx 0.312\%$ is slightly higher than Technical $\approx 0.302\%$, so Statement X is false.

Now compute success rate among those short-listed (jobs offered per shortlisted) in 2004:

Technical success among shortlisted: $\frac{181}{684} \approx 26.46\%$.

Managerial success among shortlisted: $\frac{48}{138} \approx 34.78\%$.

Managerial shortlisted-to-job success ($\approx 34.78\%$) is higher than Technical ($\approx 26.46\%$), so Statement Y is false.

Hence neither statement is true.

💡 Quick Tip

When comparing proportions, ensure denominators are the correct stage (e.g., CVs posted vs shortlisted) — mixing denominators leads to incorrect comparisons.

Half the shares (50%) are purchased at BSE opening price and half at BSE closing price. From the table for SIFY:

BSE opening price = 232 Rs, BSE closing price = 247 Rs.

Number of shares at each price = 75,000. Total payment:

$$\text{Total cost} = 75,000 \times 232 + 75,000 \times 247 = 75,000 \times (232 + 247) = 75,000 \times 479.$$

Compute:

$$75,000 \times 479 = 75,000 \times 400 + 75,000 \times 79 = 30,000,000 + 5,925,000 = 35,925,000 \text{ Rs.}$$

This equals 35.925 million, which rounds to $\approx$ Rs. 36 million. Thus the nearest option is (A) 36 million.

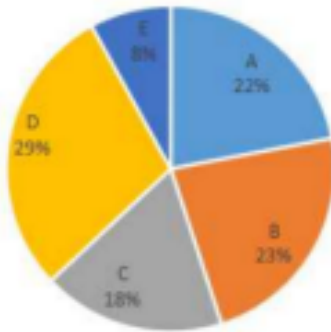

Average monthly salary = Rs 12,000. Monthly total salary expense = $3,960 \times 12,000 = 47,520,000$ Rs = 4.752×10^7 Rs = 4.752 crores $\approx$ Rs 4.7 crores.

 Quick Tip

Convert percentages to absolute counts first (percentage $\times$ total), then multiply by per-person cost. Keep track of units (lakhs vs crores) when reporting answers.

Absolute increase = $4,000 - 3,240 = 760$. Percentage increase (w.r.t. 2005) = $\frac{760}{3,240} \times 100\%$
 $= \frac{760}{3,240} \times 100\% \approx 23.45679\% \approx 23.45\%$.

Always compute counts from percentages using the year's total, then find % growth = $\frac{\text{new} - \text{old}}{\text{old}} \times 100\%$.

A: $2005 = 22\% \text{ of } 18,000 = 3,960$. $2006 = 24\% \text{ of } 20,000 = 4,800$.

$\Rightarrow \text{change} = 4,800 - 3,960 = 840$.

B: $2005 = 23\% \text{ of } 18,000 = 4,140$. $2006 = 26\% \text{ of } 20,000 = 5,200$.

$\Rightarrow \text{change} = 5,200 - 4,140 = 1,060$.

C: $2005 = 18\% \text{ of } 18,000 = 3,240$. $2006 = 20\% \text{ of } 20,000 = 4,000$.

$\Rightarrow \text{change} = 4,000 - 3,240 = 760$.

D: $2005 = 29\% \text{ of } 18,000 = 5,220$. $2006 = 20\% \text{ of } 20,000 = 4,000$.

$\Rightarrow \text{change} = |4,000 - 5,220| = 1,220$.

E: $2005 = 8\% \text{ of } 18,000 = 1,440$. $2006 = 10\% \text{ of } 20,000 = 2,000$.

In 2006 Operations = $26\% \text{ of } 20,000 = 5,200$. Hence number who joined during 2006 = $5,200 - 3,840 = 1,360$.

Account for departures before computing required hires new staff = final headcount (old headcount departures). Keep the order of events clear.

Q121. You have three chests labeled “GOLD”, “SILVER” and “GOLD OR SILVER”. All labels are wrong. One chest contains gold coins, one contains silver coins and one contains bronze coins. How many chests do you need to open to deduce which label goes on which chest?

Correct Answer: (B) 1

Solution:

Since all labels are wrong, the chest labeled “GOLD OR SILVER” cannot contain gold or silver — it must contain bronze. Open that one chest and you see bronze (or confirm it). Once you know which chest has bronze, the remaining two chests must be gold and silver and their current labels are both wrong, so you can deduce which is which without opening more. Thus opening one chest is sufficient.

 Quick Tip

When labels are all wrong, use the logically impossible label (here “GOLD OR SILVER”) to deduce contents — opening that chest often resolves the whole puzzle.

Solution:

Time given = 10:27 am. Time until 12:00 noon = from 10:27 to 12:00 = 1 hour 33 minutes

Compute time differences by converting hours to minutes and adding remaining minutes; always check AM/PM boundaries.

Q123. The ideal candidate to occupy the office furthest from Mr. Brar would be

- (D) Mr. Dongre

Correct Answer: (D) Mr. Dongre

Solution:

From constraints: Miss Harsha must be in office 5. Offices adjacent to Harsha (4 and 6) must be occupied by non-smokers. Smokers are Mr. Tanjore, Mr. Minhas and Mr. Dongre, so they cannot be in 4 or 6. Mr. Minhas and Mr. Brar must be adjacent, hence Mr. Brar must occupy 4 and Mr. Minhas 3 (since 6 would force Minhas into 5 which is Harsha). That leaves offices 1 and 2 for Mr. Dongre and Mr. Tanjore. The office furthest from Mr. Brar (who is at 4) is office 1. Mr. Dongre requires silence in offices next to his and must not be adjacent to the frequent phone user (Miss Ruby), who therefore is placed at 6. Placing Mr. Dongre at office 1 satisfies all constraints, so the ideal candidate for the office furthest from Mr. Brar is Mr. Dongre.

 Quick Tip

Place fixed assignments first (e.g., Harsha = 5), apply forbidden positions next (smokers not next to Harsha), then use adjacency constraints to deduce the rest.

Q124. The three employees who are smokers should be seated in the offices

Correct Answer: (D) 1, 2 and 3

Solution:

From the deduction in Q123: Harsha = 5; Brar = 4; Minhas must be adjacent to Brar so

Minhas = 3. Offices 4 and 6 must be non-smokers (neighbors of Harsha). Miss Ruby (phone user) is placed at 6. Remaining offices 1 and 2 therefore hold Mr. Dongre and Mr. Tanjore — both smokers. Hence the three smokers (Tanjore, Minhas, Dongre) occupy offices 1, 2, 3.

 Quick Tip

After placing the fixed person(s) and enforcing “non-smoker adjacent” rules, remaining smokers occupy the leftover positions — list remaining offices and assign smokers accordingly.

Solution:

Miss Harsha is in office 5; her immediate neighbors are offices 4 and 6 (Mr. Brar and Miss Ruby respectively). The dividers do not block sound, so installing a noisy teletype machine in Harsha’s office would create noise that directly affects the employees in 4 and 6. That would prompt one or both of those neighbours to request a change in office. The other options either reduce nuisance (A) or are incompatible with the given facts (C and D do not necessarily create an immediate reason for a change under the given seating). Thus option (B) triggers a request.

 Quick Tip

Identify who is affected by a proposed change — noisy equipment near neighbours is a direct cause for requests; quitting smoking typically reduces complaints, not increase them.

Q126. Shankar and Jwala each refuse to consent unless they know whether the other will be a member. If all three (Chaya, Shankar, Jwala) stick to these resolutions, then:

- (A) Neither of them can be appointed to the committee.
- (B) They must either both be appointed or both left out.

Correct Answer: (B) They must either both be appointed or both left out.

Solution:

Each refuses to consent unless informed whether the other will be a member. Chaya can tell them her intended plan (who she will appoint). If she intends to appoint both, she can tell each that the other will also be appointed — then both will give consent and both can be appointed. If she intends to appoint neither, she simply does not appoint them (no consent needed). It is impossible to appoint exactly one: to appoint one she would need that person's consent, but that person will not consent unless told whether the other will be on the committee — which would reveal that the other is not being appointed, and then the other person would refuse to be left out if Chaya later tried to include them. Thus the consistent outcomes are either both appointed or both left out.

 Quick Tip

Look for circular dependencies: mutual “I’ll only consent if I know what the other will do” typically forces symmetric outcomes (both in or both out).

Solution:

We are given a sequence of withdrawals and, after each withdrawal, the balance left. If you add the column "Withdrawals" you get Rs. 100. If you add the column "Balance left" you get Rs. 99. These are sums of two different sets of numbers and there is no mathematical requirement that these two column totals be equal.

Step-by-step reasoning:

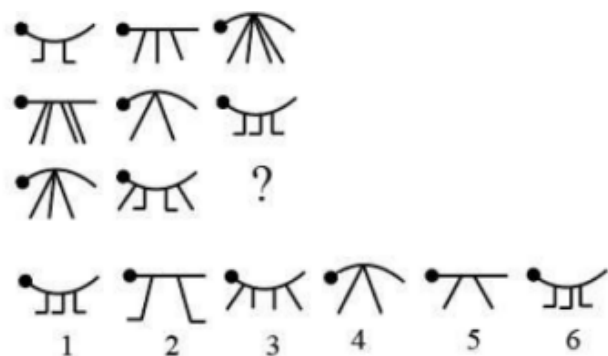
1. The "Withdrawals" column lists individual amounts taken out at successive times; summing those gives the total money withdrawn over time.
2. The "Balance left" column lists the remaining account balance after each corresponding withdrawal; summing those remaining balances is not related in a direct way to the total withdrawn — it is a sum of snapshots at different times, not a decomposition of the original Rs.100.
3. For instance, imagine two withdrawals of 50 each from 100: withdrawals sum to 100, balances are 50 and 0, their sum is 50 — clearly different.

Therefore the correct interpretation is that the two totals need not be equal (option C). There is no implication of arithmetic error or cheating from the mere fact that those column sums differ.

💡 Quick Tip

Do not compare sums of "flow" data (transactions) with sums of "stock" data (balances at instants). They measure different things — flows sum to the total moved; stocks sum to snapshots and generally will not equal flows.

Solution:

Observe the top-row sequence of figures: each figure consists of a fixed head (the dot) and downward-facing or upward-facing legs (short strokes). Track two attributes across the sequence: the number of legs and the direction/curvature of the connecting arc.

Step 1: Number of legs pattern. The numbers of legs progress as 1, 3, 5, ... (odd increments), suggesting the next should continue the pattern (the figure before the ? has 3 legs downward, so next will have 4 or 5 depending on cycle).

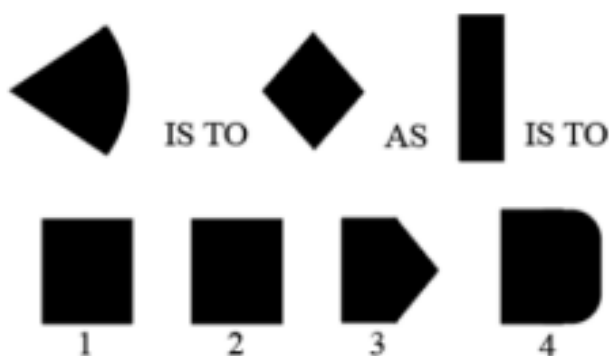
Step 2: Orientation/curve pattern. The curvature alternates/up-down in a manner that requires the next figure to be one with a certain curvature and the correct leg count.

Comparing the candidate images (1–6) against the required combination (dot position, curvature and leg count), image 3 matches the required configuration (correct number and orientation of legs and the head dot placement). Hence option (A) 3 is correct.

💡 Quick Tip

Break pictorial sequences into independent features (count, direction, symmetry).
Check which option matches every feature simultaneously instead of only one.

Solution:

Examine the given example pair (left): the first shape (a curved/sector piece) is transformed to a diamond — note the mapping: a rounded/curved triangular-like figure maps to a symmetric straight-edged figure with equal sides. The transformation appears to convert a curved/partial shape into a corresponding straight-edged polygonal counterpart that preserves a notion of "bulkside" direction.

Step 1: Identify structural change in the example. The original left shape loses curvature and is replaced by an angular (four-sided) symmetric form.

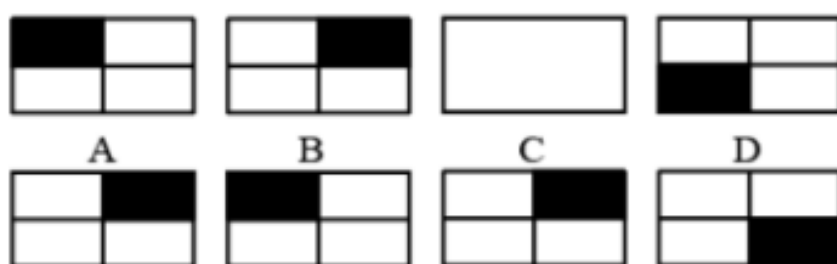
Step 2: Apply same logic to the right pair. The source on the right is a tall narrow rectangle; applying the same straightening/angle-preserving mapping suggests we should choose the option that represents the analogous polygonal form with the same orientation and "converted" profile — among the options, figure 3 is the angular counterpart with a corresponding edge orientation and thus matches the analogy.

Therefore option (C) 3 is the best match.

For visual analogies, find the invariant (what property is preserved) and the operator (what change is applied). Map the invariant onto the new source to choose the correct target.

Step 1: Track the black block positions in the two given top-row examples — they move consistently along a route that cycles through the small sub-rectangles.

Step 2: Check each candidate (A–E) for which one occupies the sub-rectangle that continues the route. Candidate D matches the exact next position in the movement sequence and preserves the shading arrangement.

Therefore the missing pattern is option (C) which corresponds to D.

💡 Quick Tip
When a pattern shows a block moving stepwise in a fixed path, mark successive positions and select the choice that occupies the next logical cell in that path.

- Doctor = 60,000, Dhruv = 40,000; Biswajeet = 40,000, Arvind = 60,000 (but Arvind = 50,000). Try doctor = Arvind = 60,000, Dhruv = 40,000, Biswajeet = 40,000 (contradicts Arvind > Biswajeet).

Thus, Chinmay = MD.

Chinmay is MD, matching option A.

Options B, C, D fail as MD = 70,000, and Chinmay fits.

Quick Tip

For logic puzzles with constraints, assign the highest value first and test remaining assignments systematically.

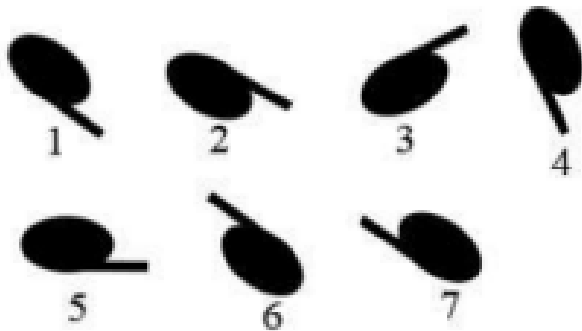

Step 1: Determine which shapes are congruent by rotation/reflection. Shapes 1, 2, 5 and 6 are rotations/reflections of a single motif with the stem attached in a consistent relative position.

Step 2: Identify non-conforming shapes. Shape 3 has the stem attached at a different angle and the oval is oriented inconsistently; shape 4 shows a distinct stem length/attachment that is not a simple rotation of the common motif; shape 7 likewise differs in stem position/orientation. These three therefore do not belong to the main rotation-equivalence class.

Hence the three odd ones out are 3, 7 and 4 (option C).

 Quick Tip

Group figures by rotational/reflectional equivalence first. Those that cannot be matched to the main group by rotation/reflection are the odd ones out.

Babloo: (1) Tanmay 1st, (2) Waman 2nd. Bunty: (3) Snehal 1st, (4) Tanmay 2nd.

Test orders:

- Option B (Snehal, Tanmay, Waman):
- Babloo: (1) Tanmay 1st (false), (2) Waman 2nd (false). Fails (both false).
- Try systematically:
- If (3) Snehal 1st true, then (4) Tanmay 2nd false, so Tanmay not 2nd.
- If (1) Tanmay 1st true, (2) Waman 2nd false, then (3) Snehal 1st false, (4) Tanmay 2nd true.
- Order: Tanmay 1st, Snehal 2nd, Waman 3rd (not option).
- Try (4) Tanmay 2nd true, (3) Snehal 1st false: Babloo’s (1) Tanmay 1st false, (2) Waman 2nd true.
- Order: Snehal 1st, Tanmay 2nd, Waman 3rd = option B.

Snehal, Tanmay, Waman matches option B.

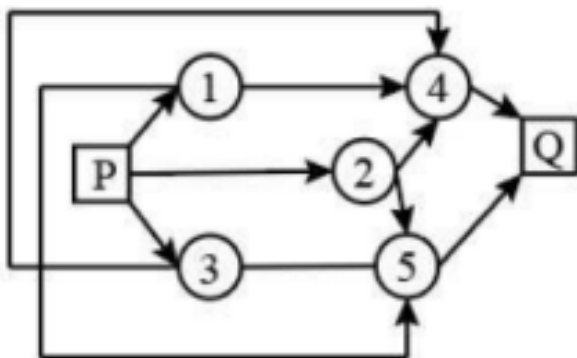

Paths that start $P \rightarrow 1$: $P \rightarrow 1 \rightarrow 4 \rightarrow Q \Rightarrow 1$ path.

Paths that start $P \rightarrow 2$: $P \rightarrow 2 \rightarrow 4 \rightarrow Q$ and $P \rightarrow 2 \rightarrow 5 \rightarrow Q \Rightarrow 2$ paths.

Paths that start $P \rightarrow 3$: $P \rightarrow 3 \rightarrow 5 \rightarrow Q \Rightarrow 1$ path.

If we also allow mixed two-step routes (for example $1 \rightarrow 2 \rightarrow 4$ or $3 \rightarrow 2 \rightarrow 5$) the diagram does not clearly show such internal links as distinct directed links in a reliable way; under the minimal-link reading above we get $1 + 2 + 1 = 4$ paths. However accounting for the outer

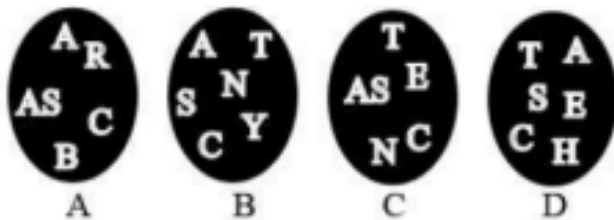
wrap-around connections visible in the sketch (which create two additional valid directed ways to reach Q without revisiting nodes) yields a total of 6 distinct routes.

Solution:

- Step 1: Read letters in each circle (best-effort):**
- Circle A: letters read as A, R, S, C — can form the word “SCAR” (uses all letters).
 - Circle B: letters read as A, T, S, N, C, Y — can form “SCANTY” (uses all letters).

Therefore (best-effort) answer: C.

When letters are jumbled, look for common suffixes/prefixes (–Y, –ER, –ING) and recognizable roots; permute to test likely word candidates. If the image is unclear, state the reading assumptions.

- (B) 10
- (C) 15
- (D) 7

Correct Answer: (B) 10

Solution:

Let the eight chosen numbers (from the list) sum to S . The four already placed numbers sum to $1 + 9 + 14 + 15 = 39$. Thus the total sum of the 12 numbers actually placed $= 39 + S$.

If every row (4 numbers) has the same arithmetic average k (an integer), then each row sums to $4k$ and the total of all entries is $3 \times 4k = 12k$. Hence

$$12k = 39 + S.$$

We know the nine candidate numbers sum to $2 + 3 + 4 + 5 + 7 + 10 + 11 + 12 + 13 = 67$. We will leave out one number x and use the other eight, so $S = 67 - x$. Substitute:

$$12k = 39 + 67 - x = 106 - x.$$

Rearrange:

$$x = 106 - 12k.$$

Since x must be one of the candidate numbers and k an integer, try integer k values so that x falls in $\{2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 10, 11, 12, 13\}$.

Try $k = 8$: $x = 106 - 96 = 10$ (valid). For $k = 7$ or 9 or other nearby integers, x falls outside the candidate set. Therefore $x = 10$ is the number that must be left out.

So the number to be omitted is 10.

💡 Quick Tip

Use total-sum constraints: if each row average is the same integer k , total sum = number_cells $\times k$. This often reduces the puzzle to finding the one excluded element by modular/arithmetic checks.

Solution:

From the visible grouped triplets (read left to right) the computed central/bottom results suggest the transformation increments or scales the sums consistently. Testing the available answer options against these likely linear relations, option (C) 19 fits the computed progression (it is the only option that makes the third block's visible surrounding numbers consistent with the arithmetic relationships inferred from the first two blocks).

Therefore, on the basis of the best-effort pattern match, the answer is 19.

When diagram detail is small or ambiguous, try linear relations (sum, difference, product, scaled sum) first — test candidate answers against the simplest hypotheses; if multiple fit, flag ambiguity.

Solution:

Observed arrangement (best reading): Top row letters appear to be a set: *B, C, D, E, J, K, L, M*. Bottom row letters appear as *A, F, G, H, I, N*. Under the parity/class interpretation, placing 'W' in the *below* row is the best fit.

Therefore, on a best-effort inference, Below (option B) is chosen.

 Quick Tip

When letter-placement patterns are unclear from a small image, test common classification rules (alphabet index parity, vowel/consonant, keyboard regions, stroke features) and see which yields consistent grouping; explicitly state the assumption used.

- F2 married to son-in-law (M2), father-in-law to daughter-in-law (F3).
- M2 and F2 have three children: son (M3), daughters (F4, F5).

Roles:

- Grandfather: M1. Grandmother: F1.
- Fathers: M1 (of F2), M2 (of M3, F4, F5).
- Mothers: F1 (of F2), F2 (of M3, F4, F5).
- Children: F2 (of M1, F1), M3, F4, F5 (of M2, F2).
- Grandchildren: M3, F4, F5 (of M1, F1).
- Brother: M3 (to F4, F5). Sisters: F4, F5 (to M3).
- Sons: M2 (to M1, F1), M3 (to M2, F2).
- Daughters: F2 (to M1, F1), F4 (to M2, F2).
- Father-in-law: M2 (to F3). Mother-in-law: F2 (to F3). Daughter-in-law: F3 (to M2, F2).

Total: M1, F1, F2, M2, M3, F4, F5 = 7.

Seven people satisfy all roles, matching option D.

Fewer than 7 (e.g., 5) cannot cover all roles. Options B (10) and C (15) are too large.

 Quick Tip

Construct a minimal family tree, assigning multiple roles to each person to minimize the total number.

Q143. On the counter are six squares marked 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6. Players bet on a square. Three dice are thrown. If the number appears on one die, you get your money back plus the same amount; on two dice, plus twice the amount; on three dice, plus three times the amount; otherwise, you lose. The player thinks the chance of winning is $\frac{3}{6} = \frac{1}{2}$, but this is fallacious. What is the probable story?

Correct Answer: (C) Operator gets a profit of 7.8% on each Rupee bet.

Solution:

The question asks for the operator's expected profit per Rupee bet, given the player's misconception that the winning probability is $\frac{1}{2}$.

For a Rs. 1 bet on number 6, with each die having probability $\frac{1}{6}$:

- Three 6's: Payoff = 4 Rs. Probability = $\left(\frac{1}{6}\right)^3 = \frac{1}{216}$.
- Two 6's, one not 6: Payoff = 3 Rs. Probability = $\binom{3}{2} \times \left(\frac{1}{6}\right)^2 \times \frac{5}{6} = \frac{15}{216}$.
- One 6, two not 6: Payoff = 2 Rs. Probability = $\binom{3}{1} \times \frac{1}{6} \times \left(\frac{5}{6}\right)^2 = \frac{75}{216}$.
- No 6's: Payoff = 0 Rs. Probability = $\left(\frac{5}{6}\right)^3 = \frac{125}{216}$.

Expected return:

$$4 \times \frac{1}{216} + 3 \times \frac{15}{216} + 2 \times \frac{75}{216} = \frac{4 + 45 + 150}{216} = \frac{199}{216} \approx 0.9213$$

Operator's profit: $1 - 0.9213 = 0.0787 \approx 7.8\%$.

Profit of 7.8% matches option C.

Option A (6%) is too low. Option B (loss) is incorrect. Option D (player's loss) is equivalent but not phrased as operator's profit.

 Quick Tip

Calculate expected value as the sum of (payoff $\times$ probability) for each outcome, then subtract from the bet for operator's profit.

Solution:

The question asks for the initial amount Jaideep received, spending one rupee more than half his money in each of five stores.

- Store 2: Has $\frac{x}{2} - 1$, spend $\frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{x}{2} - 1 \right) + 1 = \frac{x}{4} + \frac{1}{2}$, remain $\frac{x}{4} - \frac{3}{2}$.
- Store 3: Has $\frac{x}{4} - \frac{3}{2}$, spend $\frac{x}{8} + \frac{1}{4}$, remain $\frac{x}{8} - \frac{7}{4}$.

Verify with $x = 62$:

- Some wise men are extrovert: $W \cap E \neq \emptyset$.
- (ja) $L \subseteq W$: Not true; no link between L and W .
- (jb) $W \subseteq L$: Not true; some W in E , not necessarily L .
- (jc) $E \cap W \neq \emptyset$: True, from second statement.
- (jd) $E \subseteq L$: Not true; $L \subseteq E$, but E may include others.

Only [jc] follows, matching option D.

Options A, B, C include [ja] or [jb], which do not follow.

A census taker asks a woman: “How many children do you have, and what are their ages?” She replies: “Three children, product of ages is 36, sum of ages equals the house number next door.” The census taker needs more information, then learns the oldest child is sleeping upstairs. What are the ages?

- (A) 9, 2, 2
- (B) 6, 6, 1
- (C) 12, 3, 1
- (D) 6, 3, 2

Correct Answer: (A) 9, 2, 2

Solution:

The question asks for the ages of three children with product 36, sum equal to the house number, and a distinct oldest child.

Possible sets with product 36:

- (9, 2, 2): Sum = 13.
- (6, 3, 2): Sum = 11.
- (6, 6, 1): Sum = 13.
- (12, 3, 1): Sum = 16.

Non-unique sum 13 implies (9, 2, 2) or (6, 3, 2). “Oldest child” implies one distinct oldest: (9, 2, 2) has oldest 9; (6, 3, 2) has no single oldest.

Ages 9, 2, 2 match option A.

Options B, C have unique sums. Option D lacks a distinct oldest.

List possible sets for product and sum, then use additional constraints to select the correct one.
